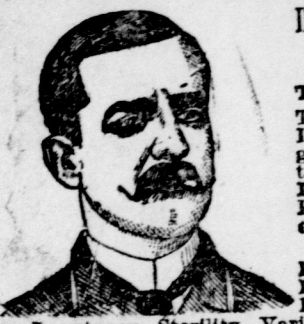

## FAIR, FOLLOWED BY RAIN.

Toronto, May 12.—11 p.m.—The pressure is comparatively high over the lake region and St. Lawrence Valley, while to the westward there is an important low area, which is causing wet weather in Manitoba and the Northwest Territories. Showers have occurred today in Nova Scotia. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Edmonton, 44—60; Calgary, 42—62; Qu'Appelle, 50—66; Winnipeg, 50—66; Port Arthur, 42—52; Fanny Sound, 54—68; Toronto, 56—66; Ottawa, 48—68; Montreal, 50—68; Quebec, 42—64; Chatham, 32—60; Halifax, 42—59.

—Mrs. E. Delmar, of this city, Mr. F. Wright and wife, of William street, and Mrs. A. J. Rogers, left yesterday morning for Toronto to attend the meeting of the Grand Lodge of the Ladies' O. B. A.

—Rev. Ralph W. Trotter, of Victoria (formerly of London), left yesterday's express on a visit to the Baptist churches of Ontario in the interests of the denomination in British Columbia.—Vancouver Advertiser-News.

—Mr. John H. McIntosh, treasurer of Stratford, was in the city yesterday afternoon en route to Niagara Falls, where he will represent Stratford Council of the Royal Arcanum in the annual meeting of the Grand Council today.

—Robert Moore, at present doing twenty days for trespass and disorderly conduct, was recommitted for ten days on an old offense in default of the fine. In July, 1894, he was in a car in London West and refused to pay his fare.

—High Constable Schram has now in his keeping seven or eight sets of harness, which have been stolen and from Hubert Smith, of London township, early last fall. Yesterday afternoon he secured his harness from Detective Ward upon proving property.

—The London Hunt Club will have the kennel at 5 o'clock. The Glenmore Bicycle Club will leave the guns at 4 o'clock and join them at the kennels to examine them. Dr. Osborne, of Hamilton, and Mr. Sweeney, of Detroit, are among the visitors taking part in the chase.

—The semi-weekly excursions to Port Stanley will commence on Saturday next and continue on Wednesdays and Saturdays during the season. The Lake Erie and Detroit River Railway make their first announcement in this issue. The fare will be as usual 50 cents, and trains will leave London at 10:05 a.m. and 2:30 p.m., returning from Port at 4:45 and 10 p.m.

—Attention is directed to the dates on which the various school examinations begin, viz.: School of Pedagogy, May 26; Normal School, practical, June 2; written, June 10; high school entrance and public school leaving, July 2; kindergarten, July 2; high school, Form I, July 7; high school, Form II, and commercial, July 11; high school, Forms III and IV, July 11.

STUART ROBSON IN "THE HENRIETTA."

## PRESBYTERY OF LONDON.

Meeting at St. Thomas—Sympathy for Rev. W. J. Clark.

The Presbytery of London met in conference Monday afternoon and evening at Knox Church, St. Thomas. Rev. J. Little, of Lobo, presided. There were present Revs. Dr. Proudfoot, Dr. Sutherland, J. Milloy, A. Henderson, J. Currie, E. H. Savers, J. Courtenay, R. McIntyre, T. Wilson, A. Wilson, J. McNeil, M. P. Talling, J. G. Stuart, R. Stewart, J. F. Scott, J. A. Macdonald, and a number of elders.

The subject of conference was "Public Worship," and the opinion prevailed that some uniform order of service be adopted, subject to change on special occasions. Several orders were suggested, and the opinion prevailed that the Synodal committee be asked to prepare two or three orders of service, to have them included for adoption in the new Book of Prayer. The subject of pulpit prayer was also discussed, and the importance of careful attention being given to this part of public service was urged.

Yesterday morning the Presbytery met for business at 9 o'clock. Those present were Revs. W. J. Clark, W. H. Anderson, J. H. Barnett, J. H. Brown, and Messrs. Stevenson Shield and other elders.

The report of the committee of statistics for the past year was submitted by the convener, Rev. M. P. Talling. The report indicated progress.

Rev. W. J. Clark was given three months leave of absence, and a resolution expressed condolence with Mr. Clark in his recent bereavement.

Mr. W. H. Salmon, of London, a graduate of Yale University, was given the standing of a catechist. He is pursuing a special course of study. A call from Dorchester and Crumville to Rev. W. Malcolm Kay, recently of Duart, was presented, and representatives heard in its support. The call was sustained and transmitted to Mr. Kay, and was accepted, and he will be inducted at Crumville on Wednesday, May 27, at 2 p.m. The moderator will preside, Rev. G. H. Smith will preach, Rev. J. Currie will address the ministers, and Rev. J. G. Stuart will address the people.
