### The Hospital for Sick Children.

An Advertiser subscriber asks us to publish the following letter, which appeared in the Exeter Times:

"Dear Sir,—Many of the readers of your valuable paper will be asked to contribute towards the maintenance and endowment of the Hospital for Sick Children, Toronto, and I desire to give a few words of advice to Sunday school officers in regard to the final disposition of their gifts. These contributions should be given either towards the \$19,000 debt or towards the ordinary expense of maintenance. No Stinday school should ever consent to have its money used for the endowment of a cot or cots. The hospital trustees have appealed to Sunday schools to co-operate in a scheme for the endowment of cots under the name 'The Ontario Sunday Schools Cot.' It takes \$2,000 to endow a cot sufficiently to secure the right to name it, and \$5,000 additional is required in order to satisfy the trustees that the cot is independently endowed. Fraternal specieties and other organizations. "Dear Sir,-Many of the readers in order to satisfy the trustees that the cot is independently endowed. Fraternal societies and other organizations have responded to the appeal for endowment. Let me ask our Sunday school officers whether God will, or will not be pleased, if they hand over to the money lenders the money with which they have been entrusted, knowing that only the interest of their gifts will be used to provide for sick children. That is what the endowment scheme means. I believe that such an appropriation of his gifts is not only faithless but sinful. "God may justify a dying man in trying to perpetuate his name by means of money bequeathed to endow a cot, but the Sunday school, unlike the man, is an undying organization, which will be able to contribute annually toward the

an undying organization, which will be able to contribute annually toward the needy. The hospital trustees should have faith in the perpetuity of Sunday schools and believe that Christians of the future will be as sympathetic and liberal as those of past generations. The debt upon the hospital should be paid and the annual cost of maintenance liberally sustained, but no hospital should ever be independently endowed. It will be said that the endowment of the sick children's hospital exists in name only, because the money is used to pay debt and cost of maintenance and that no money is actually out on interest as enand cost of maintenance and that no money is actually out on interest as endowment. But it is no credit to the trustees that such is the case, and as soon as they can pay off the debt they will begin to pay back to the endowment fund all the money now borrowed from it. Therefore, it is only a question of time until the money sent by our Sunday schools will be put out on interest as endowment, because Sunday schools have consented to have their gifts recorded as endowment.

"Let us keep the hospital dependent upon the annual contribution of a people whom the trustees will deem it wise to please. By so doing this worthy hospital will be saved from becoming a place where the helpless and unfortunate are, under the fair name of charity, kept for the benefit of medical students and having as little freedom to correspond with friends as a criminal in a common jail. ## WITH GOOD MILK.

Iverage Quality Over 4 Per Cent of Butter Fat-One Dealer Disqualified.

Following is Health Officer Hutchinson's semi-annual report upon the quality and condition of London's milk supply:

The Chairman and Board of Health-Gentlemen, I herewith submit my semi-annual report upon the inspection of herds, dairies and market milk for the half-year ending Dec. 1. As heretofore, the herds, byres and dairies classed according to merit, A, B and C, and the milk 1, 2 and 3. One vendor whose percentage was 3.75, protested. and was given 3.60 by the public anallyst. The average percentage of all the market milk, exclusive of that with cream added, was a fraction over

The quality of milk supplied the city is still good. The average percentage of 213 samples of market milk examined during the year, exclusive of 23 samples examined for private persons, was over 4 per cent. The samples were cleaner than in former years, and to this and the good quality may be attributed the small number of deaths of infants from derangement of the digestive organs.

Nine thousand quarts are sold daily in the city. Two samples had been watered, one had cream added, and one byer was unfit for dairy purposes by reason of uncleanliness. One hundred and forty persons are employed in supplying the city with milk.


