RUSSIAN TROOPS RECALLED.

Owing to Representations Made by Japan.

Chinese Said To Be Prospecting for a New Capital—Poor Outlook for Early Settlement of Trouble.

KICK BY JAPAN.

London, April 16.—According to a dispatch to the Daily Express from Tokio, dated yesterday, the detachments of Russian marines stationed at Ma San Pho have been recalled owing to Japanese representations.

"The Chinese imperial court, through the Chinese minister at Tokio, has thanked Japan for assisting China to resist the Manchurian convention," says the Shanghai correspondent of the Standard, "and has asked for Japanese aid and support in any future contingencies."

NEW CAPITAL TO BE SELECTED. Shanghai, April 16.—Advices from Sian Fu to the local mandarins assert that the court is preparing to go to Hsiang Yang, in the Province of Hu Pei. The permanent officials of the six boards are described as having quietly left Peking for Sian Fu in anticipation of the selection of a new capital.

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TO ROOT OUT ROBBERS. The German war office has received the following dispatch from Count Von Waldersee: "Major Von Schoen-berg, with infantry, mounted infantry, cavalry and artillery, has been sent to disperse robbers in the mountains northeast of Chang Ping Chu. A company of troops from Chang Ping Chu will intercept the retreat of the robbers."

OUTLOOK LESS PROMISING. Paris, April 16.—It is reported from a trustworthy source that the outlook for an early settlement of the Chinese indemnity question is less promising than a week ago. The negotiations between the powers are bringing out conflicting ideas and interests, and are likely to be very protracted. The proposition of the United States to limit the total indemnity to \$200,000,000 is the only one under discussion and is not regarded with favor by more than one government. The others consider the sum too small, and are disinclined to reduce their claims to the figures the United States desires.

DIVIDING THE INDEMNITY. A Washington dispatch published in London, affirming that the United States proposes that the indemnity be divided between the powers in proportion to the number of troops which participated in the actual relief of the legations at Peking, is regarded as incorrect. No such proposal has reached the French government, which con-

siders that the entire expense incurred as a result of the whole operations carried out must be taken as the basis for indemnity. It is believed that the claims of individuals will be first presented and paid. This matter will be expedited as much as possible, in order to allow an early resumption of commerce and work on other foreign enterprises. Nothing is known here of the reported intention of the emperor to return to Peking without the dowager empress, and no faith is placed here in the reported hostility between Russia and Japan. French information indicates that conciliatory negotiations are proceeding between those two countries, with the prospect of a thorough understanding regarding the claims of both towards Manchuria and Corea.

ATROCIOUS MURDERS!

Attributed to Two St. Thomas Brothers.

Storekeeper Shot Dead by the Men Who Robbed His Place.

A Detective, Who Was a Canadian, Also Killed While Attempting to Arrest the Marauders—A Third Brother in Custody.

Pittsburg, Pa., April 16.—Detectives made another arrest yesterday in connection with the gang of burglars who killed Grocer Thos. D. Kahney and Detective P. E. Fitzgerald last Friday. Wm. Biddle, a conductor, employed by the Consolidated Traction Company, was taken just as he was handing in his resignation, preparatory to leaving town. His arrest was caused by the CONFESSION OF THE MURDERER OF Detective Fitzgerald. This man has been known as Edward Wright. He said that his brother was Edward Wright, and gave the addresses of two brothers. The officer who arrested the street car conductor took from the latter's room a satchel full of gold and silver, which had been stolen by the gang. It is claimed the conductor tipped the gang on houses along his route, information regarding which was gleaned from see-ants and others traveling on the cars.

BELOUG TO ST. THOMAS, ONT. The Biddles are Canadians. There are four brothers here, the fourth one being Harry G. Biddle. The latter is a resident of Knoxville, where he is well and favorably known. There is no charge against him. There is a fifth brother, George, whose whereabouts is unknown. All were born and lived at St. Thomas, from which place they went to Detroit.

Edward and John, who were taken from the house No. 32 Fulton street, where Fitzgerald was killed, claimed to be traveling men. The brother Harry says Ed would not have shot the detective had he not become panic-stricken. The man who had been in Bedford street house, charged with being a member of the same gang, today confessed that his real name is J. P. Dorman, and that he has a brother, P. O. Dorman, living at 106 Arlington street, Cleveland, Ohio. It is thought this man also came from Canada.

VICTIM ALSO A CANADIAN.

The funeral of Detective Fitzgerald was held yesterday. Several thousand people were unable to gain admittance to St. Rosalie's Roman Catholic Church, where a high mass was sung over the body. Fitzgerald was also a native of Canada. He came from Ottawa, and had been connected with the police department here for twenty-five years. He was given the name of "Lucky Fitz" because of never having received a scratch in over a dozen battles with the robbers. He left a widow and six children. A public fund, in which over \$2,000 was contributed in 24 hours, is being raised for them.

IDENTIFIED. Mrs. Thos. D. Kahney, wife of the Albert street grocer, who was killed during an attempt to burglarize his house today, identified two of the Biddle brothers as the men who were in the house when Kahney was shot. Her 12-year-old son is also sure of the identity of the brothers. Until today the police and no positive evidence against any of the men in connection with the Kahney murder.

Ed. Biddle received four wounds in the fight which followed the killings of Fitzgerald and Kahney. He was taken to the hospital, where he is recovering. Dorman was undoubtedly get long terms in the penitentiary, as over \$5,000 worth of stolen goods was found in his possession. He was also found with a gun.

STORY OF THE CRIME. Three men, who first gave their names as Ed. Wright, J. P. Wright, and Robert Wright, robbed the home of Thos. D. Kahney, a grocer, on Mount Washington, early Friday. Kahney was murdered while trying to rescue his wife from the clutches of the robbers, one of whom was in his home. Mrs. Kahney.

HAD A PRESENTIMENT that a member of the family would die before morning, and refused to go to bed, walking back and forth for a mile, and then to the house of a friend, where he was sleeping and the adjoining apartment, which her 12-year-old son occupied. She kept a light burning all night.

At 2 o'clock she fell asleep, lying fully dressed across the foot of her son's bed. Half an hour later she was awakened by the robbers, who were attempting to chloroform her.

She screamed, and her husband ran to her rescue. The man freed one hand, and drawing a revolver, fired at her husband. The bullet entered Kahney's side. In the region of his heart. He died while trying to return to his room for a revolver.

ARREST OF THE BURGLARS. How the police suddenly discovered the names of the burglars and their whereabouts is not known, but Fitzgerald and Gray, of Pittsburg's "front office" force; Patrolman West and County Detective Robert Robinson received warrants for the three men, and went direct to 72 Fulton street, where the fugitives were hiding.

Fitzgerald, one of the plainest officers of the department, led the way, and it was he who opened the door of the room in which the men were waiting to make their final stand.

A FATAL SHOT. Ed. Wright (Ed. Biddle) recognized the detective and fired. As in the case of Kahney his aim was true, the bullet striking Fitzgerald's heart. Gray and West opened fire and Wright was hit four times. When he fell the policemen closed in, and arrested J. P. Wright (John Biddle) and Wilcox. Ed. Wright was taken to Mercy Hospital. Ed. Wright's wife was arrested and held in custody.

THE WOMEN ARRESTED. The houses of the two Wrights were subsequently searched, and the alleged wives of the men arrested. Immense quantities of plunder were recovered, the result of numerous robberies in the district. Documents were also found showing that neither of the men were married, the women

who passed as their wives being Jessie Bodine, a music teacher, of Milwaukee, and Jennie Siebus, of the same city. None of the party are over 25 years of age.

FOUR CLASPS

That the Canadian Infantry Will Be Entitled to Wear.

Ottawa, April 16.—According to the regulations made by the war office governing the issue of the South African medal, the Canadian infantry will receive four clasps: "Cape Colony," "Paardeberg," "Dreifontein," and "Johannesburg." "D" Battery men will receive three clasps, "Cape Colony," "Orange Free State," and "Belfast." The Mounted Infantry and Royal Canadian Dragoons will receive clasps for "Johannesburg," "Diamond Hill," "Cape Colony," and "Orange Free State." The Royal Canadian Dragoons will also receive the "Belfast" clasp.

STILL JAMMED

Ice Continues to Rush Into and Blockade St. Clair River.

Detroit, April 16.—Still in navigation blocked through the length of the St. Clair River. A port that is clear of ice one day may be jammed full of it the next, for the reason that every day a drift of the jam above loosens and carries a greater or less distance down stream before it runs against a check. A number of steamers with cargoes of grain for Port Huron and Sarnia will get away from Chicago the early part of the week, but there will be no general sailing of the Buffalo boats for a week yet, unless conditions improve wonderfully in the ice jam.

IN AN OLD BUSTLE

Where a Detroit Lady Found \$500 Worth of Money and Jewelry.

Saginaw, Mich., April 16.—The mysterious disappearance last fall of over \$500 worth of money and jewelry belonging to Mrs. Martin V. B. Meredith has been cleared up. The property was laid away at the time of the death of Mr. Meredith, and it could not be found until a day or two ago, when some boys playing in the yard at the residence, where the Merediths lived at the time of his death, found an old bustle, and kicking about the yard as a football, the jewelry and \$80 in money was discovered. It has been identified. Mrs. Meredith is in Detroit.
