## CASH GRANT AND SUBSIDY

These Favored for Bruce Mines Railroad.

London's Board of Trade Indorses Its Application.

The London Board of Trade, at its regular meeting yesterday afternoon, committed itself to an indorsement of a proposal to have the Ontario Government grant the Bruce Mines and Algoma Railway a land subsidy of 7,400 acres per mile, and the Dominion Government a cash subsidy. The matter was taken up on the meeting being addressed by the solicitor of the company, Mr. J. McKay, Sault Ste. Marie. The attendance at the board was small, the following being present: President Minihnick, Secretary Nelles and Messrs. C. B. Hunt, John Bowman, James Mattinson, J. A. Carrick and W. Benson.

## BITUMINOUS COAL DUTY.

The communications included one from the Sudbury Board of Trade asking for co-operation in memorializing the Dominion Government to remove the duty on bituminous coal. The secretary informed the board that he had written the Sudbury secretary to say that the London board has already taken action.

Mr. C. S. Hyman, replying to the communication from the board of trade in regard to the removal of the duty on bituminous coal, said: "If the removal of the American duty was permanent I would strongly advocate and am quite sure that the Government would cause the removal of the Canadian duty on bituminous coal, but in the face of the fact that the American duty is only removed by the matter of one year, and may be reimposed at any time after that time, it would seem most unfair to the Canadian producers of bituminous coal to force them, by the removal of the Canadian duty, to seek new markets for their coal and largely increase their expenditure in placing their coal with the uncertainty of the duration of the American duty before them. There is no doubt that reciprocity in coal would be to the mutual benefit of Canada and the United States, and so far as I am concerned, I am prepared to advocate and urge such a course upon the Government, but I feel quite sure, on reflection, the board will see the unfairness of a one year's arrangement only."

Rev. Dr. Chown, on behalf of the Methodist Church, department of temperance and moral reform, wrote to say that it was "highly expedient for a strong and united effort be put forth to obtain effective legislation suppressing political corruption." The Premier of the Dominion had decided that the whole matter should be referred to a special committee, and the London Board of Trade was asked to bring all

## COUNTY COUNCIL HASN'T

THE RIGHT TO LEASE LAND

Can't Give Over Property to Traction Company Without Legislation.

The county council, which opened its June session yesterday afternoon, as mentioned in last evening's Advertiser, resumed this afternoon. The balance of yesterday's session was devoted to the reading of several communications. A discussion also arose over the liability of the county for the maintenance of a certain patient in the Home for Insane.

The communications were referred to their respective committees with the exception of those mentioned as otherwise disposed of.

The secretary of the St. Mary's Collegiate Institute sent in a claim for a grant from the county.

A communication was filed from the County of Frontenac, which reads: "A resolution passed by the township council of East Williams was presented. It requested the county council to pass a bylaw prohibiting pack peddlers from selling goods within the county. The communication was filed."

The Laura Secord National Monument Committee asked the council for a grant to help them in their efforts to erect at Queenston a suitable and worthy national monument to the memory of Laura Secord, the heroine of Upper Canada, who saved the Province from the invaders in 1813.

Supt. Heard, of the Victoria Hospital, wrote inviting the council to visit that institution. The invitation was accepted for Wednesday afternoon.

A communication was also received from the Victoria Hospital, inclosing a statement showing an account of \$608.75 against the county for patients during the past five months. The number of patients had been 29, a considerable reduction from the previous two years.

The secretary of the board of education of Wardsville notified the council of the resignation of Mr. Harvey influence to assist in this patriotic effort.

This communication was laid over for further consideration.

## TRANSCONTINENTAL LINES.

The Quebec Board of Trade requested that a resolution be passed by London indorsing the plan to make a condition of the charter for any transcontinental railway that the terminal points be in Canada only, at St. Lawrence ports in summer and at St. John or Halifax in winter. The board could not see what way London would be interested and the document was ordered filed.

A communication was received in regard to the coming congress of the chambers of commerce of the empire at Montreal, from Aug. 17 to 20, giving the itinerary of the tours, which include a visit to this city, Aug. 26. It stated that the railway and steamboat companies had offered free transportation throughout Canada, that the local boards of trade, wherever a stop was made, were extending courtesies to the delegates, and that the principal sights to be seen under the most favorable conditions.

The city council was asked to proper entertainment in London was laid over for the present.

## BRUCE MINES RAILWAY.

The regular business of the board has been disposed of. Mr. McKay was heard in reference to the Bruce Mines and Algoma Railway. He gave a description of the country, and pressed the claims for governmental assistance. Among other things he pointed out that the project would develop Ontario and benefit this district; the line was projected from the Town of Bruce Mines, on Lake Huron, north-easterly to Hudson Bay, a distance of about 400 miles; already the company had constructed their line from Bruce Mines to the Rock Lake copper mines, a distance of 17 miles, and had already expended in railway construction and mining developments about \$750,000. There were very promising indications of the existence of iron ore and other mineral in the interior, at the present inaccessible, and numerous large areas of very fertile land interspersed throughout this district. If a subsidy were granted to the company of \$7,400 acres per mile, subject to the payment of \$2 per thousand acres on the pine on such land for two miles in addition to the usual Dominion subsidy, Mr. M. J. Clark, of Grand Rapids, Mich., and his associates who command over \$1,000,000 were prepared to proceed this year with the construction of at least 35 miles. They were also confident that they could secure other capitalists to join with them to push the line to Hudson Bay within a reasonable time, and for a distance of 125 miles the line would pass through the 15,000,000 acre wheat belt in the Moose Valley, 3,000,000 acres of which would be within 25 miles of this portion of the said line of railway. If the grants were made, numerous other factories and mills would go up, and the country would be opened up to the country. The building of the first 100 miles would cost \$2,500,000, and would require a further investment of about \$10,000,000 to secure a remunerative traffic for the line of railway.

Mr. McKay stated that the boards of trade in Owen Sound, Berlin and Windsor had indorsed the requests of the company, and he asked the London board to pass similar resolutions.

Mr. John Bowman, in moving the resolution, stated that he believed the board was in sympathy with the capitalists who open up the country, and the more rapidly they opened up the country the better it would stimulate manufacturing and business of all kinds. The resolution was seconded by Mr. Mattinson, who also spoke in favor of having the not only the county but the province opened up. The president pointed out that capitalists required courage and energy to go into such countries, and unless they were given the subsidy the country would lie dormant. The resolution was then passed. It stated that "in the opinion of this board of trade, the Government of Ontario should grant the subsidy asked for (a land grant of 7,400 acres a mile, subject to payment of dues of \$2 per thousand on the pine on such lands), or such other subsidy equal in value per mile to that which has already been granted to other railways in the northern portion of the province, so as to secure the construction of this

PLAY THE SAME OLD TUNE

Water in Reservoir Has Been at Good Height During Month.

It is unlikely that rides on the merry-go-round will be enjoyed by city children at Springbank this season. 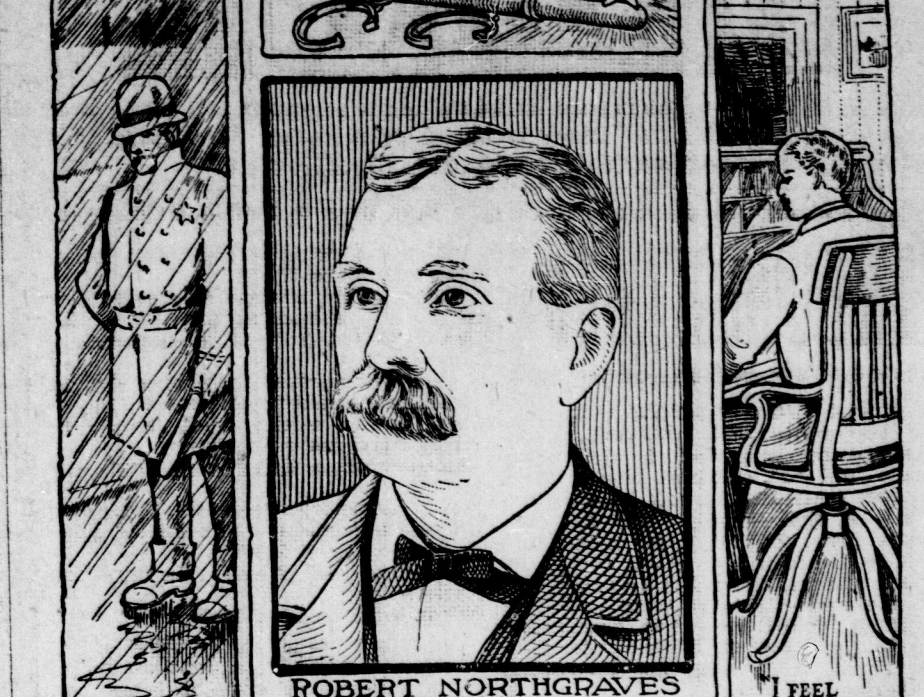
