A Settlement in Sight. Anglo-American diplomacy has given the public a surprise by calling up the Alaska boundary dispute again. There had been no intimation that the foreign offices were moving so rapidly in the matter. It was supposed the question was indefinitely shelved when the Joint High Commission broke up, and the fear has been expressed that some occurrence in the disputed territory would bring the question to a dangerous point, and make a peaceful settlement almost impossible. A Washington dispatch today says a treaty has been signed by United States Secretary Hay and Sir Michael Herbert, the British ambassador, providing for the reference of the question to a tribunal of six jurists, three to be chosen by each party. The dispatch also says that this is virtually the same proposition as that brought forward by the American members of the Joint High Commission four years ago, and rejected by the British and Canadian nembers of the commission. The Britsh proposition was that an arbitral tribunal should be immediately appointed, to consist of three jurists of repute. One was to be selected by the judicial committee of her Majesty's Privy Council, a second by the President of the United States, and the third by the two persons so nominated. The counter-proposal of the United States commissioners provided that the tribinal should consist of "six impartial jurists of repute," three nominated for Great Britain by the judicial committee of the Privy Council and three nominited for the United States by the Preident. The British commissioners reected this proposal, as it carried no quarantee of finality. In a tribunal of ix, three each side, the probable reult would be a deadlock. The Amerian members of the Joint High Comnission suggested that a South Amercan be the seventh jurist, but the British members declined for very obious reasons. The South American publics are under the tutelage of the Inited States, and in the presence of he Monroe doctrine it was not likely hat a Spanish-American representaive would decide in favor of a European power, no matter what the merits of the dispute might be. The Amerian commissioners also desired to make a condition precedent to arbitration hat all towns and settlements on tidevater then under the jurisdiction of the nited States should remain within Inited States territory, whether with-British territory or not. The Brith commissioners would not agree to his. They took the ground that to reognize that all towns or settlements

There as been no disposition on their part analyze the Canadian claims or gue the case fairly and dispassionely. They have simply raised the ngo cry of "What we have, we'll old." The Washington Government ay have desired to meet the Britishnadian position, but there was no cellhood that the Senate would conr in the face of public opinion. The esent arrangement, therefore, is no ubt the maximum of concession that n be wrung from the United States. e Canadian Government, it may fely be said, has pressed for better ms, but imperial interests have had be considered, and while the comsition of the tribunal is not entirely tisfactory to Canada, and does not eet the justice of the case from a nadian point of view, the treaty will' accepted and Canada will abide ally by the verdict. \$9,000 FOR 12 ITALIANS

Wreck at Seneca, Mich.

Damages That Were Claimed Aggregated \$600,000.

Detroit, Jan. 26. - Twelve suits brought by Father Francis Beccherini as administrator of the estates of Italians killed in the Wabash wreck at Seneca, Mich., on Thanksgiving Day, 1901, have been settled and discontinued, the Wabash Railroad Company paying \$750 damages in each case or a total of \$9,000.

The damages claimed in these cases aggregated \$600,000. The settlement, though, at the amount mentioned, is considered an advantageous one. Under the Michigan law the damages recoverable in each case would not be more than the amount each of the dead men could have earned up to the date of his majority. The average age of those for whose deaths damages were sought in these cases was 18 years and they had earned from 48 to 50 cents per day in Italy before coming here. At this rate, working every day until they attained full age, it was calculated that each would earn about \$900, from which must be deducted the cost of living, etc., calculated at \$400, and this would leave \$500 as the possible damages recoverable. The cost of preparing for trial, contesting the applications for administration at Chicago, taking of testimony in San Francisco and other points in this country, and also in Italy, would be heavy and much time would be lost in litigation, as the cases would be carried up on appeal, in all probability.
