THE DEED OF A BASTARD TOO THICK WITH DOWIE

Explanation of Dynamite Outrage at Washington.

Attempted Murder Followed by Suicide—30 Lives Imperiled.

Washington, Sept. 25.—In connection with the dynamiting of the Golden Eagle Hotel here early this morning, by which the proprietor, Louis Brandt, and his wife were injured, the following statement is made:

The proprietor gave a banquet in honor of his wife, who had just returned from Germany, and Frank McKie was a guest.

McKie had boarded at the hotel four years and had been treated as a member of the Brandt family, which includes a daughter, Sophie, with whom McKie is said to have been in love. Brandt denies that there was any understanding between the two. McKie remarked last night that he was going to wait until Sophie returned from Germany with her mother and then was going to his old home in Philadelphia.

Mrs. Brandt and her daughter returned about 8 o'clock last night. The attempt at wholesale murder followed this morning. McKie, with a pistol in his hand, was seen by an employee of a lunch room opposite the hotel just before the shots were fired. When the explosion occurred a slight blaze sprang from the debris, but it was quickly extinguished.

Brandt and his wife were rescued before many of the 30 guests of the establishment had reached the part of the building in which McKie's room was located. McKie, with revolver clutched in his hand, was found lying on the floor with his head in a pool of blood. A bullet hole near the right ear had caused instant death. Brandt was bruised about the body and shaken up badly and received a severe cut on the left leg.

Why Gen. Booth Is Hurrying Over Here.

Wants to Alienate His Family From Dowie's Friendship.

New York, Sept. 25.—Gen. William Booth, the patriarchal head of the Salvation Army, is arranging his affairs in Chicago in order that he may reach New York as quickly as possible.

Though no one at Salvation headquarters will admit it, it is said that the aged founder of the great organization is fearful lest too many of his family become entangled with Alexander Dowie, Chicago's self-proclaimed prophet.

Herbert Booth, the general's youngest son, is the latest of the family to become friendly with Dowie. Until recently he was the commander of the army's Australian forces. But now he is in Chicago for the purpose of studying Dowie's organization and his self-styled "mission."

Ex-Commander and Mrs. Booth-Clubb, the latter Gen. Booth's daughter, who came to this country after resigning as army leaders in Holland, have zealously come to Dowie's support, and defend his cause. Salvationists declare that Herbert Booth has come to Chicago at their invitation. Should Herbert Booth decide to cast his lot with Dowie, the army might be dealt a worse blow than it got when Bullington Booth left it in 1884.

Already there is trouble in Chicago. Gen. Booth is expected in New York within ten days. He is billed to address his followers Oct. 5 and 6 in this city, and as soon after as possible he will hurry on to Chicago.

MR. PICKWICK II. NOW IN CHICAGO

He's the Man Who Worries Mr. Chamberlain.

NEVER KNOWN TO LOSE TEMPER

Alfred Davies, Welsh Member of Parliament—Punch Renamed Him.

Chicago, Sept. 25.—Pickwick the Second, read the Chicago yesterday says the Tribune. In appearance and stature, in unflinching serenity of temperament, he was a happy reminder of the famous creation of Dickens. In plain nomenclature, Pickwick the Second is Alfred Davies, Welsh member of the British Parliament, leading Radical and thorn in the side of Secretary Chamberlain. Davies, who is head of a big international express company, and a favorite subject of the Punch cartoonist. Mr. Davies is making a trip through the United States, and came to Chicago last night where he promised that Wales would send a good exhibit to the exposition.

"I have often been asked why I am called Pickwick, and I always have to answer that I do not know," said Mr. Davies. "Punch started it, and that settled it; I have been Pickwick ever since."

THIRDS JOKES ON CHAMBERLAIN. Perhaps it is partly because I don't lose my temper and like to crack a joke. That sort of thing, you know, aggravates a man like Joseph Chamberlain, who can't take a joke. You know he hates to be worried by having a man keep on asking him questions, as I have done, until he is forced to make some sort of answer. He likes to silence you with a frozen stare. But they can't silence me in that way, and I keep after them till they have to say something."

Mr. Davies has been a thorn in Mr. Chamberlain's side ever since he entered the House of Commons. He took issue with his especially in regard to the Jameson raid.

"Now, on my return to England," said he, "I am going to devote my time and energies to doing the best I can for the educational bill, which would compel the people to support the denominational schools without having control of the schools. It is making some of the Tory members of parliament shake in their shoes."

ABOUT POLITICS IN ENGLAND. "The Government party has already lost the district of Leeds and had its majority at Seven Oaks cut down 4,000 on account of the snap and gas. It is to come. PLAN TO KEEP WARM.
Business Men Will Build a Big Central Heating Plant.

Cleveland, Ohio, Sept. 25.—Cleveland's big storekeepers and manufacturers have a plan to build a central heating plant and incidentally they will establish a novel heating, lighting and power plant.

It is the largest business blocks down town have formed a combination to reduce the cost of power, heat and light, and incidentally to get rid of the cloud of smoke that hangs over Cleveland all the time.

Plans will be completed in a few days for an enormous central plant. It will burn slack coal at \$1 a ton, and circulate heat, light and power to surrounding buildings over a radius of half a mile.

It is figured that the saving of fuel and labor by the big concern will amount to at least \$1,000,000 a year. Smoke consumers are eager to approve of the scheme. The scheme has grown out of the agitation to clear Cleveland of its pall of dense black smoke, through which the sun can rarely be seen.

If the experiment is satisfactory it will doubtless result in the plan being adopted all over the city. It is said it would be quite practical for a central company to furnish the power, heat and light to the city, including heat for cooking.

WELSH COIL IN NEW YORK.
New York, Sept. 25.—Four thousand tons of Welsh coal, chiefly large size, anthracite, reached here today. None was offered for sale as all had been contracted for before the order was placed by the local company which made the importation. All day the coal dealers were besieged by coal buyers eager to obtain some of the coal or to place orders for shipment to be made hereafter. The price at which the Welsh coal is quoted could not be learned.

GRAND TRUNK EXTENSIONS
West of Chicago May Parallel the Canadian Pacific in Manitoba.

Chicago, Sept. 26.—The Chicago and Grand Trunk has very comprehensive plans for making that line a trans-continental system.

Chas. M. Hays, general manager of the Grand Trunk, has been quietly perfecting a programme of extensions west from Chicago. He returned here last week from London, where his plans were submitted to the Grand Trunk board, and it is said that they have been approved by the directors. The plan is to extend the Grand Trunk through Wisconsin and Minnesota to St. Paul, thence northward to the Canadian Pacific, practically paralleling the Canadian Pacific.

This report comes from one of Mr. Hays' assistants, who says there is no question that active work in the way of construction will begin within twelve months.

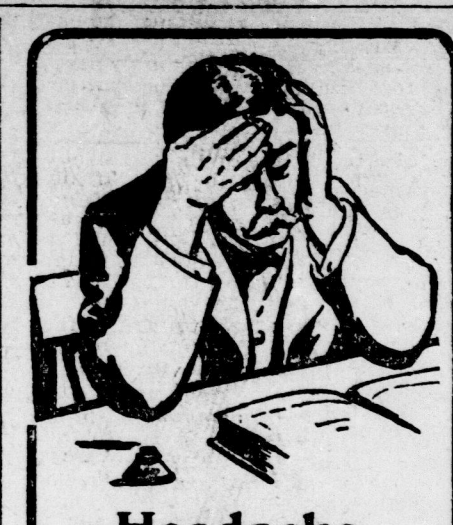
MATRIMONIAL TRUST RAIDED
