THE DEED OF A DASTARD TOO THICK WITH DOWIE

at Washington.

Attempted Murder Followed by Suicide-30 Lives Imperiled.

Washington, Sept. 25. - In connection with the dynamiting of the Golden Eagle Hotel here early this morning, by which the proprietor, Louis Brandt, and his wife were injured, the following statement is made:

The proprietor gave a banquet in honor of his wife, who had just returned from Germany, and Frank Me-Kie was a guest.

McKie had boarded at the hotel four years and had been treated as a member of the Brandt fam'ly, which includes a daughter, Sophie, with whom McKie is said to have been in love. Brandt denies that there was any understanding between the two. McKie remarked last night that he was going to wait until Sophie returned from Germany with her mother and then was going to his old home in Philadelphia.

Mrs. Brandt and her daughter returned about 8 o'clock last night. The attempt at wholesale murder followed this morning. McKie, with a pistol in his hand, was seen by an employe of a lunch room opposite the hotel just before the shots were fired, When the explosion occurred a slight blaze sprang from the debris, but it was quickly extinguished.

Brandt and his wife were rescued before many of the 30 guests of the establishment had reached the part of the building in which McKie's room was located. McKie, with revolver clutched in his hand, was found lying on the floor with his head in a pool of blood. A bullet hole near the right ear had caused instant death. Brandt was bruised about the body and shaken up badly and received a severe out on the left Mrs. Brandt sustained bruises about the body and a cut hand.

When the wrecked building was searched today enough dynamite was found in McKie's trunk to blow up a block of buildings. There were six whole sticks and parts of two or three broken sticks, together with a box of caps and a quantity of wire for long distance explosion. He had at least nine sticks of dynamite in his possession.

McKie was about 28 years old. He was formerly of Philadelphia, and had relatives in Chicago. His brother, Harry McKie, was killed in Chicago. year, according to a telegram found in the dead man's room today. McKle was a machinist in the navy yard here, but resigned on inherit-ing upwards of \$20,000 about four years age. This amount he is said to have lost on the races and his act is accredited by some to this loss.

PLAN TO KEEP WARM

Business Men Will Build a Big Central Heating Plant.

Cleveland, Ohio, Sept. 26.—Cleveland's big storekeepers and manufacturers have a plan to side-step the coal trust and incidentally they will establish a novel heating, lighting and power plant.

Men who own the largest business blocks down town have formed a combination to reduce the cost of power, heat and light, and incidentally to get rid of the cloud of smoke that hangs over Cleveland all the time. Plans will be completed in a few days for an enormous central plant. It will burn slack coal at \$1 a ton, and circulate heat, light and power to sur-

rounding buildings over a radius of half a mile. It is figured that the saving of fuel and labor by the big concern will amount to at least \$1,000,000 a year.
