WILL STAY ANOTHER YEAR


Rev. C. T. Scott to Remain at Dundas Street Church.

POLICE KILLED BY BOY BANDITS

Johnson, mortally injured in robbery of Chicago City Railway car barns Aug. 20; Johnson was assassinated on a bench in outer office, and was awakened and shot and killed before he could rise.
