The Finish of the Champ.

When Britt came up for the eighteenth round and it was seen he was unrefreshed, the Dane took immediate advantage of the situation and pressed his man, landing heavy blows on the face. After one minute and seventeen sconds, Nelson landed terrific right and left blows to the body and follewed this with a right to the jaw, dropping Britt in his own corner. That the blows were terrible ones was shown by the fact that Britt turned black in the face and that his tongue. which protruded from his mouth, was coated with blood.

The fight, take it all in all, was one of the fiercest as well as one of the squarest that has ever taken place on this coast. The Dane won because of his phenomenal endurance, while the clever boxer went down to defeat for the first time in his career because he could not withstand Nelson's tremendous punishment.

The fight had many novel features. The surroundings, the crowd, the bitterness of the men toward each other, the uncertainty as to whether there would be a fight at all up to within a quarter of an hour before the battle actually began, with the cleverness and the endurance displayed by the two hoxers, made the bout one of great interest to followers of pugilism.
