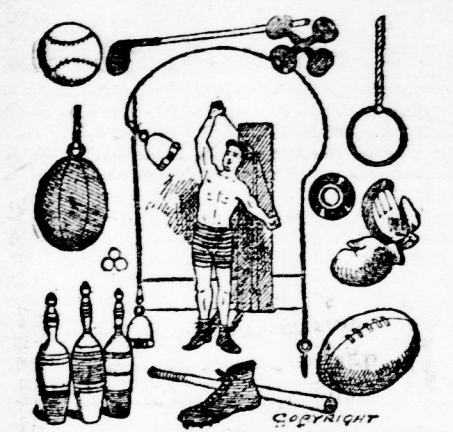

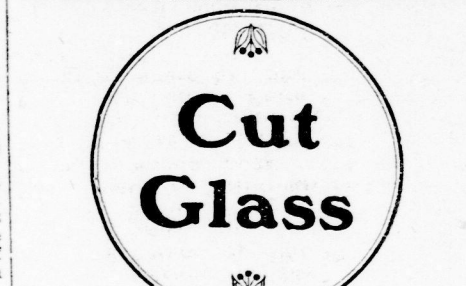

## EIGHT CASES FOR NON-JURY COURT

Docket To Be Heard by Chief Justice Falconbridge Is Not Very Heavy.

There will be eight cases at the non-jury assizes next Monday. Chief Justice Falconbridge will preside.

Arthur vs. Cushing is a suit brought to wind up a partnership in an ice business. The plaintiffs are George Arthur, D. Collins and James Steele, and the defendants are William and Edward Cushing. The defendants enter a counter-claim for \$569.32, and also for unstated damages for the alleged seizure of ice by the plaintiffs. Cushing & Dromgoole, for the plaintiffs, and Meredith, Judd & Meredith, for the defendants.

The case of the Monarch vs. the York Mutual is an action between two first insurance companies to recover title and costs alleged to be due on a policy issued to J. V. Behine & Co., Toronto, whose factory was burned in 1904. McKillop & Murphy, for the plaintiffs; Hall & Kyle, of Toronto, for the defendants.

Johnston vs. Ashplant is an action by E. M. Johnston to recover \$2,000 alleged to be due him as compensation for a judgment secured by C. B. Armstrong, on the ground of giving a life lease, and shown defendant by the plaintiff in paying him \$3,200 before the assignment of the Western Shoe Company. McKillop & Murphy, for the defense.

Pool vs. Huron and Erie, is brought by Thos. K. Pool, of Glenora, to recover the balance of \$125.00, which was paid the Huron and Erie Savings Company to purchase property for plaintiff, which the company refused to return. Elliott & McDonald, for the plaintiff; Cronyn & Betts, for the defense.

McDonald vs. McDonald is an action brought by John A. McDonald, of Ekfrid, against his father, Archibald McDonald, to set aside a lease for some property on the Longwood road. The plaintiff alleges that he was given the property by his father on condition of giving a life lease, and by mistake the lease was made for 99 years. The father, Archibald McDonald, entered a counter-claim for \$2,000 rent, and alleges that the son obtained a lease by stealth, had the word "year" changed to "years" and under its new form, Elliott & McDonald, for the plaintiff; Stuart & Moss, Glenora, for the defense.

McLarty vs. McLarty is a suit by Alexander McLarty, Metcalfe, to recover from John McLarty, of the same town, the sum of \$100, the balance of a judgment secured at the fall assizes for the seduction of his daughter. It is alleged that the property desired by the defendant has been placed in the hands of another son to defeat the ends of justice. Elliott & McDonald, for the plaintiff; Stuart & Moss, Glenora, for the defense.

Robinson vs. McGilivray is a suit brought by Robinson, Little & Co., against M. McGilivray, a former merchant of Listowel, and J. W. Scott. It is alleged that the latter induced the plaintiff to sell his property to the defendant, and it is asked that the sale be declared void and a receiver appointed, bringing in the property for the plaintiff. Blewett & Bray, Listowel, for the defense.

Scribner vs. Ryan is a suit brought by G. W. Scribner to recover \$1,250.77, alleged to be due plaintiff on the sale of a patent to Joseph Russel of Battle Creek, Mich. The defendant, Peter Ryan, of Toronto, is alleged to have acted as guarantor. McEvoy & Pearson, for plaintiff; W. M. Hall, Toronto, for defense.

## DIRTY BUSINESS STOPPED

U. S. Officers Discover Big Plant for Making Obscene Pictures.

Chicago, Nov. 4. — Probably the largest plant in the United States for the production of obscene photographs has been discovered in Chicago, and its business has been broken up by the police. Secret service officers of the postoffice department have for several years been seeking the places where thousands of obscene pictures came from, and yesterday with the assistance of the police, they found it at 173 Milwaukee avenue. The proprietor, Thomas Collins, was arrested and sent to jail in default of \$3,000 bail, while 120,000 obscene photographs and negatives were seized. Just as the place was entered by the police, a delivery of 10,000 card mounts for pictures was made by a Chicago house.

## WANT 20-MILL RATE OR LESS

Real Estate Owners Favor Combined Effort to Lower Tax Burden.

A committee of the Real Estate Association last night presented the following resolution to a meeting of the association and it was unanimously adopted:

"That, whereas other cities and towns not any better off as well situated as is the city of London, are running on a lower tax rate and increasing their industries as it were by leaps and bounds, this city has not increased in the same proportion as it should do, and thus, notwithstanding the heavy burden on the taxpayers to build paved streets, increased fire protection, abundance of the purest spring water, having a 10,000-gallon pumping plant, and the magnificent system of railways largely helped into existence by the public contribution from the taxpayer, that we have not only not been getting our share of new industries, but we have been called upon to help those already here by way of fixed assessments and exemptions, we attribute this state of affairs to the excessive or high tax rate levied on an exceptional high assessment, thus burdening the unfortunate taxpayer at two ends."

"We therefore suggest that this association invite the board of trade to appoint a committee to meet a committee from this association to arrange if possible for a joint meeting of all the spending bodies sending a similar committee, such as the library board, the school board, the waterworks, the hospital, and the city council, to try to adopt some general plan by which a combined effort may be made in presenting the same to the electorate for their approval and co-operation in bringing the tax rate down to a level 20-mill rate and to keep it at or below that point."

Figures were also adduced at the meeting to prove that a half-mill rate to which the public library is entitled is altogether too much to run the institution, and the statement was made that, if the library board will propose a mill rate, a mill will prove ample if the library board exercise economy, inasmuch as the library is now well equipped and appointed.

## BROOCH WAS STOLEN
