KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS BLACKBALLED MEMBERS

Toronto Paper Says There Is Trouble Brewing in That City.

Toronto, Feb. 18.—The Star says: Considerable ill-feeling has been stirred up against the Knights of Columbus in this city on the receipt of the Columbian, the organ of the society, by the local members this morning. In it is published a list of six more or less prominent Roman Catholics who have fallen under the ban of the society.

No one disputes the right of the Knights to allow into their order whoever they please, but it is the general opinion that they ought to keep their doors private and not publish to the world what has been done in executive council.

Three of the gentlemen in question, it is declared, "are not, and never have been, lawful members of the order."

The suspension of one member for six months and of two others for one year, is also concerned in.

These are what are called by the executive "The Toronto Cases."

In reference to the establishment of a court in Toronto the Columbian has the following:

"What the Columbian Says."

"Voted that the establishment of the order in Toronto, Canada, be left in the hands of the supreme knight."

The supreme knight is Edward L. Hearns, of New Brunswick, and the vote was taken at the regular quarterly meeting held at New Haven on Jan. 11 and 12.

The leaving of the matter in the hands of the supreme knight is considered as a means of shelving the establishment of the order here until such time as the local ecclesiastical authority consents to its formation.

Instead of the matter being in the hands of the supreme knight, it is rather at the disposition of His Grace Archbishop McEvey. While his grace was Bishop of London he was opposed to the order being established here, but shortly after coming to this city the opinion got abroad that he would consent to a Toronto court. Since then, however, things have happened which give foundation to the belief that he will not now consent.

His sermon to the members of the Catholic Mutual Benefit Association at St. Michael's Cathedral a couple of Sundays ago was nothing less than a condemnation of the secret societies. To this class the Knights of Columbus belong. He also condemned the "silly rituals" and apings of secret forms of condemned societies.

"Let others have the grills and passwords which exclude all who are not familiar with them," he said. The Knights, it is known, pride themselves on the gorgeousness of their ritual.

RAISED SALARY OF NEW BISHOP

Synod Added One Thousand Dollars and Made Total \$5,000.

Toronto, Feb. 17.—The actual business of the synod was not commenced till this afternoon. Ven. Archbishop Sweeney dined at a small bell and the meeting came to order.

The appointed prayers were read by the Archbishop of Peterboro.

On the motion of Canon Welch and Dr. Worrell, the synod passed a unanimous resolution of sympathy with the widow and family of the late Archbishop Sweeney, Canon Welch, Canon Cody, Messrs. N. W. Hoyle, K.C., and F. E. Hodgins, K.C. Various communications and matters financial, were referred to the court on contested seats.

Raised Bishop's Salary. Before proceeding to the election, Mr. F. E. Hodgins presented a motion, seconded by Dr. Hoyle, that the prospective bishop's salary be raised from \$4,000 to \$5,000.

There need not be any discussion about this, said the Hon. S. H. Blake, from the front bench.

And there was not. The motion carried unanimously, and with applause, following were appointed scrutineers:

For Clerical Vote—Rev. J. E. Fenning, E. A. McIntyre, and J. D. Falconbridge.

For Lay Vote—Rev. H. O. Tremayne, Thomas Mortimer and Phillips Dykes.

An adjournment for half an hour was then taken to allow the committee on contested seats to report.

THE YANKTON HOME

Messenger Boat of the Pacific Fleet Arrives at Hampton Roads.

Fort Monroe, Va., Feb. 17.—A messenger from the homecoming United States fleet, the Yankton, arrived here today and began to take on a supply of coal preparatory to proceeding to Washington in response to a dispatch from the Navy Department.

The Yankton will return to Hampton Roads in time to greet the fleet and then will journey back again to the capital to convey some of the official party to the review next Monday.

From the moment of the departure of the battleships on Dec. 16, 1907, the Yankton has hardly known a moment's rest. She is but a mile or so from the front line of the fleet, and has been a plaything for the storms of the "seven seas."

With a displacement of only 975 tons as against the 16,000 of the Connecticut, and her class, the little Yankton has been hammered and pounded by giant seas. Even to the last day of the voyage the fight of the vessel against the elements continued and when the anchors were let go in the roadstead this morning, Lieut. Commander McVay in command, knew practically his first rest from duty on the high seas for three days and nights.

The safe return of the Yankton is one of the distinct achievements of the cruise.

CAMILLE ROBERT DEAD

Was a Tilbury Ex-Reeve and Resided There for Many Years.

Tilbury, Feb. 17.—Tilbury lost one of its oldest and most respected citizens this morning, the person of Camille Robert, reeve of Tilbury North Township, who died after a brief illness. He has resided in this vicinity for over 50 years, and was 74 years of age.

He was born in Lacolle, Quebec, in 1838, and came to Tilbury North when he was twenty years of age. He was elected deputy reeve of Tilbury North in 1895, and re-elected by acclamation in 1896 to the same office. In 1897 he was elected reeve and in 1898 he retired from public life. VOID AFTER 15 DAYS FROM DATE.

A LIGHT DAY IN LEGISLATURE

Some Estimates Passed But Real Business Will Commence Today.

(Special to The Advertiser.)

Toronto, Feb. 18.—The Provincial Legislature yesterday afternoon started upon the second stage of its session, the first having been the purely formal and social function of the opening day. While not yet entered upon the actual work of legislation, that duty will not be long deferred, as the debate on the motion for the reply to the speech from the throne is not expected to be lengthy. It was the Government's wish that only the mover, seconder and the leaders of the two parties should speak, but the Liberals decided yesterday to take advantage of the opportunity afforded by the debate and several of their number will take up the discussion of the province's affairs in general.

The address delivered by Mr. W. H. Hearst, member for Sault Ste. Marie, and mover of the reply, was a more than ordinarily effective inauguration of the debate. He spoke fluently and interestingly, and while confining himself in the main to the various heads of the speech from the throne, he paid special attention to the progress and needs of New Ontario, displaying an intimate first-hand knowledge of the conditions in that large and important district. Mr. Hearst is certain to prove a valuable acquisition to the ranks of the Government's debaters.

Mr. J. W. Johnson, West Hastings, who seconded the motion, covered a wide range of subjects, and his address in which the imperial spirit and the personal note played equal parts. He laid stress upon the need for better police, better fire departments, and advocated the formation of a provincial force acting under a central authority.

The Premier and Hon. Frank Cochrane introduced Mr. Albert Grigg, member-elect for Alsimoa, he having been elected W. R. Smith, the Mail, who resigned the seat to enter the House of Commons.

The Opposition Speakers. Mr. McEwing, West Wellington, seconded the adjournment of the debate and will speak next for the Opposition. Mr. J. P. Downey, South Wellington, will follow for the Government, and Mr. McCormick, East Lambton, will speak for the Opposition. Mr. McDougall, Ottawa, is also slated as an Opposition speaker.

Passed Some Estimates. In order to carry on the work of the Government until the estimates are passed, and to relieve distress among pensioners and straitened taxpayers, the House went into supply, and passed estimates for \$750,000.

Sir James Whitney informed the House that 30,000 copies of the statute revision committee had been working, were ready for distribution today, and would therefore be distributed to the members, in order to save time, and that there should be no waiting. There was nothing new in the statutes, he said, and much time would be saved by their distribution today.

Mr. McDougall, East Ottawa, asked if the changes were distinctly marked in the bills, and was assured by Sir James that they were easily found in the bills.

A Short Session. Hon. J. J. Foy then introduced all the bills which have been revised. Before adjournment, Sir James informed the House that if the members would pay better attention to private bills, and work four days a week instead of three, there was no reason why the session should not be concluded before Good Friday.

Moving Pictures. In answer to Hon. Mr. MacKay's question, Hon. Mr. Matheson said the legislation introduced last session designed to prevent disasters in moving picture theatres, had been found insufficient, and would be supplemented at the present session.

After Sir James Whitney had made his pleas that the members co-operate in order to rush through the work of the session, Hon. Mr. MacKay, while concurring in the Premier's remarks, asked if as much progress could not be made by working hard on Friday and then cutting out the Monday session. Sir James said he doubted if that would be a wise course, but said he would confer with Mr. MacKay later.

Wants Lobbyists Tagged. Allan Studholm, Hamilton's Labor member, repeated his oft-made suggestion that members be fined for non-attendance. He said that some went away on Wednesday or Thursday and did not return until the conditions of the session had changed. Mr. Studholm also protested against the manner in which lobbyists wasted the time of committees, and he thought lobbyists respecting action on bills should be tagged, so that the members could avoid them.

Mr. McDougall suggested the Ottawa system of \$5 a day for each bill which was not entered until after the prescribed period.

Statute Revision. The statute revision bill introduced by Mr. Foy included the following measures: Respecting arbitrators, to amend the Judicature act, respecting public officers respecting witnesses respecting notaries public, respecting juries, to provide prompt punishment for perjury at provincial elections, respecting sheriffs, respecting law stamps, respecting railway accidents, respecting county and district judges, respecting county judges, respecting judges of the peace, respecting estates of intestates, respecting actions of libel, respecting absconding debtors, respecting crown attorneys, respecting notaries public, respecting dowry, respecting execution, respecting mortmain, respecting division courts, respecting investments by trustees.

The legislative program was organized yesterday for the session, and elected the following officers: President, Hon. Mr. Matheson; Vice-president, J. A. McNeill, the Mail and Empire; secretary-treasurer, Harvey Black, the News; executive, E. H. Archibald, the News; Mr. McDonald, Mail and Empire; W. Bert Roadhouse, the Telegram; A. E. S. Smythe, the World.
