switchmen and baggagemen are out in London. Superintendent Bowker stated to The Advertiser that he estimates that 60 per cent. of the men are out.

NO FREIGHT MOVING.

Not a pound of freight has moved since the men went out at 9:30 last night, and it is only by using the most strenuous measures that the company have been able to keep their through expresses and the mail trains go-
