

WILL BRITISH ARMY OFFICERS JOIN ULSTER REBELLION?

Interesting Story From Belfast—Authorities Disquieted by the Increase of Firearms in Ulster—Anti-Home Rule Campaign Opens.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Sept. 13.—A cable to the Tribune from London says:

A remarkable story comes from Belfast that before embarking on the present campaign against home rule, the leaders had received the assurance that in the event of home rule being pressed to its final stage a certain number of army officers, representing every branch of the service, would throw in their lots with the Ulster men.

The list is said to include many officers of high rank, with 26 colonels and lieutenant-colonels, 43 majors, 69 captains, 31 lieutenants, and 288 men holding the rank of sergeant-major or sergeant.

Ulster's campaign against home rule will open with a big meeting today at Enniskillen. This is the first of a series of demonstrations which will culminate on October Day, when the members of the Unionist community will bind themselves by a solemn

league and covenant to refuse submission to a Nationalist Parliament.

One of the most disquieting features of the present situation is the increase in the number of persons who own firearms. In the Nationalist district of West Belfast one dealer is disposing of revolvers at the rate of one hundred a week, and expects that this rate of sale may continue for some time, a large number of the weapons being disposed of on the club system.

There is reason to believe that what is happening in West Belfast is also taking place in other districts, and notably in the city of Dublin. The authorities are perfectly well aware that the traffic is being carried on, and some time ago, the Government actually discussed what steps could be taken to deal with the importation of these arms. It was then decided to take no action at the moment, and thus matters have been allowed to drift.

BOMB-DROPPING AEROPLANES LATEST TERROR OF FLEETS

King Watched Sham Battles at East Anglia—Large Number of Hydroplanes To Be Purchased To Attack Battleships.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Sept. 13.—A London cable says: King George watched the sham battles in East Anglia yesterday between the Blue and Red armies, congratulating the Territorials on their splendid work.

Commander Sampson was captured by the Red army, his biplane having developed a defect. As it has been proved that hydroplanes can make deadly attacks on warships, the Admiralty has decided to add largely to its fleet of hydroplanes at Eastchurch. It was reported that bombs were dropped down the funnels of the warships from a height of 1,000 feet with absolute accuracy. The new oil-driven battleships now being designed, it is said, will have armor-clad decks and armored funnel shields to protect them from the bomb-dropping aeroplanes. They will also be fitted with guns of high elevation for attacking air craft.

As there is a possibility of an anti-torpedo craft and anti-air craft weapon. When required for work against surface vessels it has a range of 13,000 yards with 31-pound shells. It can be elevated nearly 80 degrees, at which angle its effective height ranges in 3,000 yards. At a distance of four and a half miles it can send a shell to a height of 13,000 feet.

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BOILER IS UNSAFE SAYS SUPERINTENDENT

Lively Row Is Expected Over Purchase Made by Kincardine Board.

A rather lively time is expected over the new boiler, as the superintendent declares it unsafe, and says must be fixed before winter. Some severe reflections have been passed upon the commission for having ordered the new boiler and accepting it from the builder without consulting the engineer.

It has now come to light that the boiler was ordered without the consent or knowledge of the old board, and that it has not come up to the requirements. The commission voted not to send the fee for membership in the Ontario Municipal Association.

TUMULT PREVAILED ALL THROUGH SESSION

Riotous Scenes Prevent Hungarian Parliament From Doing Business.

[Canadian Press.] Budapest, Hungary, Sept. 13.—The riotous scenes which occurred at the opening of the Hungarian Parliament yesterday were witnessed again this morning when the sitting of the Chamber of Deputies was resumed.

The Opposition members concentrated their attack upon Herr Beothy, the minister of commerce, who was struck in the face several times, and whose friends did not succeed in rescuing him until he had fallen to the floor.

Even before the beginning of the sitting, the greatest excitement prevailed. The Opposition deputies appeared in the chamber in full force, and as soon as the Government deputies began to come in the uproar began, the new arrivals being hailed with a storm of abuse.

An opposition member shouted the word "scoundrel" at Minister Beothy. The latter thereupon made a step toward his adversary, and asked: "What did you say?" Immediately the Oppositionists rushed at the minister, striking him with their fists until he fell to the floor. After some struggling, the cabinet official was finally rescued by friends.

When the president of the lower house, Count Stephen Tisza, took the chair the tumult, which broke out yesterday, and which was continuous throughout the sitting, was resumed.
