Ottawa, Oct. 21. - During the six

months, April 1 to Oct. 1, of the curcent fiscal year, 278,649 immigrants arrived in Canada. Of this number 183. 990 arrived at ocean ports, and 89,659 from the United States. These figures show an increase of 13 per cent. as compared with the number of arrivals for the corresponding months of last iscal year, which were 158,614 at ocean ports and 83,317 from the United States, making a total for the six months, April 1 to Oct. 1, 1911, of 241,981 rersons. 


