SUCCESSION DUTIES CASE DECIDED AGAINST PROVINCE

Privy Council Rules Cannot Be Collected Outside the Province.

Toronto, Nov. 12.—Cable advices received in Toronto yesterday that the privy council had reversed the judgment of the supreme court of Canada and decided that succession duty may not be levied on personal property situated outside the province will have a serious effect on local revenues. The case in point is that of the King vs. Cotton, Province of Quebec, which, stripped of its legal aspect, simply decides that only that portion of an estate situated within the province may be taxed for succession duty. Real property heretofore has been exempt under such circumstances, but personal property, such as stocks, bonds and mortgages, has been assessed for succession duty by the province where the deceased was domiciled at the time of death. In the Cotton case most of the personal property was situated in the United States, and objection was made to

paying a double tax, one to Quebec and another to the state where the property was held. The supreme court of Canada held with Quebec, but the privy council by the cable yesterday has reversed that decision.

Big Loss to Ottawa.

Inquiry at the Parliament Buildings yesterday revealed the fact that this decision will probably mean hundreds of thousands of dollars annually to the provinces of the Dominion. Between Ontario and the other provinces of Canada, except Quebec, there has been a reciprocal arrangement so that double duty would not be exacted from an estate. Quebec, in view of the fact that a large number of big corporations had their head offices in Montreal, chose to keep out of any such arrangement, with the result that the Cotton litigation arose, and it now loses whatever might have come from a reciprocal arrangement. Hon. J. B. Lucas, in discussing the privy council decision, declined to be interviewed. He was not inclined to think that the decision could be retroactive, and although there will be an appreciable effect on the provincial exchequer, he could not say just what course would now be pursued.

FIFTEEN INJURED IN WRECK ON MARQUETTE

Train on the Allegan Division Goes Into the Ditch.

Holland, Mich., Nov. 11.—A passenger train on the Allegan division of the Pere Marquette went into the ditch three miles out of here tonight. About 15 persons were injured. Spreading rails were the cause. Thomas Cecil, travelling salesman, of Detroit, has internal injuries. His condition is serious. Two coaches left the rails and all the passengers in them were hurt. The cars caught fire and burned, but the injured were taken out before more than one passenger who has not been identified was caught scorched. William Filkins, the engineer, Ed Egan, conductor, and about 15 were believed to be in Detroit, have many cuts and bruises and internal hurts. Bollinger, the mail clerk, is not expected to live.

Rev. Joshua Stansfield Refers to Evil Effects of Gluttony.

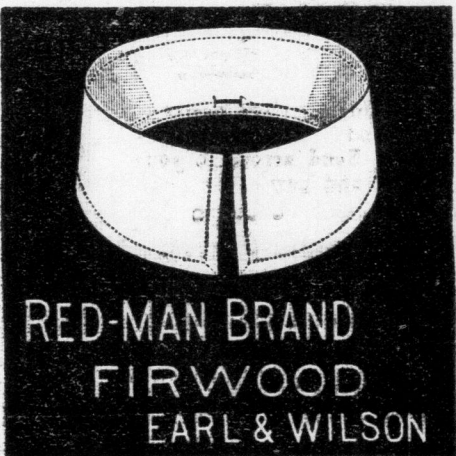


Cashier's Office Now On Fourth Floor
