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

Representatives of County and City Will Go Into Question in June.

DR. BRUCE SMITH HEAD

Inspector Explains a Modern Method of Caring for Prisoners.

Middlesex County Council and representatives of the London City Council will thoroughly consider the industrial farm project advocated by Sheriff D. M. Cameron, and definite steps will be taken, in all probability at the June sessions of the county council, towards the establishment of a joint prison farm for London and Middlesex. Dr. R. W. Bruce Smith, inspector of prisons for Ontario, addressed representatives of the county and city councils in the county buildings yesterday and spoke enthusiastically in favor of the plan. At the conclusion of the address, Mayor C. M. R. Graham, who presided, assured Dr. Bruce Smith that the project would be the recognity grane. the project would be thoroughly gone into, plans considered and sites looked for, before the June sessions of the county council. Representatives of the county received Dr. Bruce Smith's recommendations with favor.

Cites Fort William.

Fort William prison farm was established in September, 1912, on 1,000 acres of uncleared land. Now it is practically all cleared and 300 acres are under cultivation. In another year, said Dr. Bruce Smith, it will be selfsustaining. Out of 1,200 prisoners who have been sent to the farm, only eight attempted to creape, and of these five were brought back. A pristhese five were brought back. A prisoner attempting escape is liable to two years' imprisonment in penitenti-There are no bars, no keys, no stripes, no guns to hold them. If they refuse to work their rations are cut. This is the only form of punishment resorted to.

Farm No Playhouse. Seventy per cent of the prisoners in Ontario are short-term offenders who should be sent to prison farms. There are 142 jails in Ontario, necessitating an enormous expense for maintenance, nearly all of which would be rendered unnecessary by the general establishment of prison farms. When a man is sent to the prison farm, he is told that it is no play-



If they hire out at more lucrative employment than work on the farm, such as bricklaying or carpentering in the vicinity of the farm, the extra wages are paid to their dependent families or to the prisoners on their discharge from the farm. Men on the Toronto farm earn \$40 and \$45 a month at such trades. The Heutenert governor can rades.
