HAS HAD LONG TRAINING

Continental Experience Stands
Her in Good Stead in
Work.

War has created many new departments in women's fashions. In the Canadian Courier of this week a special article on clothes and why should Paris design them for Canadian women refers to the work of Miss Grace Hyman of this city, now engaged in the new profession of designing clothes for the elite of New York.

To be a successful designer you must be first an artist and second a dressmaker, says the Courier, and Miss Hyman is both of these.

A somewhat unusual portrait, a drawing of Miss Hyman by herself, accompanies the following:

"Miss Grace Hyman of London is an accomplished artist, who has had the benefit of continental training, and was for some years a designer for Harper's Bazaar. She has shown great dexterity in making clothes, and her friends say that whenever she is invited to a particularly nice party she designs and makes a new gown the night before. She also they say, has a room in her house with nothing but a rag carpet and a stove she would emerge in a Parisian costume. Since the war she has combined her two talents and is now designing clothes for other people. Simplicity is their keynote, and it is combined with elegance, for they are to be worn by the fastidious patrons of Wauchope's, New York, and their costumes are executed by expert French tailors and dressmakers.

"Not only in fashionable garments is Miss Hyman a success. She has also a taste for the bizarre, and has designed many posters where eccentricities of style are elaborated. A fancy dress ball gives her an opportunity to create wonderful and grotesque costumes worn at the recent Beaux Art ball in New York, though sketchily executed in a few hours previous to the event. Itself, were amongst the most admired costumes on the floor."

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UNIQUE MEETINGS TO BE HELD IN VICTORIA PARK

Rev. John MacNeill, Noted Evangelist,
to Deliver Addresses Nightly.

Victoria Park will be the scene of unique meetings all next week, when Rev. John MacNeill, the noted Scotch evangelist, now of Denver, will give short addresses from the bandstand every evening at 8 o'clock. Mr. MacNeill will arrive from New York on Monday afternoon.

Special music will be provided by some of the finest soloists in the city and the choirs of the various churches will also assist. A piano will be used for accompaniment, and the services of a cornetist have also been secured.

Meetings of this character are somewhat of a novelty in London, and from this fact, as well as on account of the reputation of the speaker and the promise of good music, will attract very large crowds each evening. The soldiers as well as citizens will no doubt attend in great numbers.

There were prepared complete instructions on the preparation and disposal of documents for distribution to all units on formation in Canada, and the pay and records question thoroughly discussed and decisions arrived at.

At the period the department in England was sending the preparation and completion of all the papers from the force, the organization of orderly rooms and quartermaster stores, the issue of regular muster passes, and the issue of regular muster passes, and the audit and inspection of quartermaster stores, regimental institutes, canteens and messes.

It was necessary in October, owing to lack of accommodation at Shorncliffe camp, to form a second Canadian Battalion in England, and the return of the direct and indirect branch office was opened at that place for the purpose of carrying on the administrative and assisting the divisional staff in organizing and preparing to proceed to France later as the 3rd Canadian Division.

When then a complete general report of all arms and departments was prepared, with charts showing a chain of responsibility in each case on which to base the proposed organization of the Canadian force.

Hon. the minister of militia, and an officer was detailed to proceed to Canada to present and discuss new arrangements for the Canadian force.

Employment of ex-soldiers discharged as unfit for further service. This was satisfactorily completed by the end of December.

Activities Extended.

Returns were compiled and a card index instituted for the purpose of recording officers' services and their standing in the C. E. F. and England, information a graduation list was prepared and necessary corrections made to the army list. The intelligence department was organized along more methodical and efficient lines.

The number of casualties being returned to Canada for discharge, convalescence, and employment; and the vast amount of detail in connection with the handling of this most important branch of the department.

The procedure in effect at this date for the handling of all Canadian casualties being medically boarded, those being found "fit for duty" being posted to a training company, and all others posted to a casualty company.
