CANADIAN FUNDS REACH HIGHEST LEVEL IN YEARS

Premium Has Fallen Ten Points On New York Market in Past Three Months.

EXPORTS FALLING OFF

Investments Show Unprecedented Demand For Canadian Government Securities.

NEW YORK, Jan. 3.—(By Canadian Press).—Canadian financial conditions in the New York market showed a big improvement during the last three months of last year, this improvement being very largely reflected in the re-duction of the premium on New York funds which has fallen over ten points es compared with the premium at same time last year when it reached 19 per cent, the highest point in recent his-tory. By the end of last year the premium had fallen to 17 per cent and this week it was in the neighborhood of 6% per cent, the closest exchange has been to par for over two years.

The consensus of opinion among banking men here indicates that business conditions in the United States have improved and it is felt that this improvement is beginning to have a re-troactive effect for good on Canadian business. It will appear that there is how a good deal of United States capi-tal available for foreign investment, and in the last three months there has been an unprecedented demand for Canadian bonds—particularly government secur-ities—and the fact that \$25,000,000 of Canadian Pacific Railway 4 per cent de-benture stock has been purchased by a syndicate headed by the National City Rank and including the Guaranty Trust Company, indicates the estimation in which Canadian securities are held. This debenture stock is being offered at a price for a railroad flotation in this inarket for many years, according to the Wall Street Journal

Tariff Checks Trade.

From the point of view of financial men here export trade has not shown a noticeable improvement. Although Canada continues to buy more from the United States than any other country with the exception of the United King-dom and to sell more to the United States than any other country, and although one-half of Canada's total trade with the world is with the United States, the introduction of the United States emergency tariff has substantially checked the further growth of trade between the two countries.

The most striking feature in Canadian-United States trade during the year has been the marked effect of this tariff upon Canadian exports to the United States. For the seven months ending October, 1921, Canada's total trade with the United States decreased \$403,000,000 as compared with the total trade between the two countries for the corresponding period ending October, 1920. Canadian exports to the United for this period (including re-excorts) fell from \$317,000,000 to \$157,000,000—a reduction of nearly \$200,000,000. Canadian exports of vegetable products to the United States were cut in half-falling from \$62,000,000 to \$29,000,000; animal products from \$45,000,000 to \$25,-000,000, and wood, wood products and paper from \$141,000,000 to \$82,000,000. It must, of course, be borne in mind that the reduction in this trade as expressed in dollars is to some degree attributable to the fall in prices, but
