#### Cynthia Grey's Mail-Box

AUNT MARIA'- FLOWERS. I notice that a number of the writers to the Mail Box were inspired by those sunny, warm days with the same feeling that I experienced-a revived interest gardening activities. Seed and gardening activities. Seed catalogues, with their bright colors and tempting array of seeds and roots were examined, and though I no longer feel confident of producing such wonderful results as those pictures in the catalogues, yet they have not lost their charm for me, though I have examined them every spring for many years. Though I have noticed many seeds have been sent to the Mail Box I have not applied for any, neither do I save seed myself, except oc-casionally. It has been my experience that in the case of several kinds of flowers, they deteriorate from year to year, from seed saved at home. I do not know why. I have been told that in saving seed from asters or zinnias, one should take it from the flower on the main stem and not from the branches, and thus the flowers may be kept up to the standard. I cannot say whether there is anything in this. My aim is always to get as much bloom as possible from my flower ing plants, and the flower on the main stem is the first one to mature.

If one lets this ripen seed the blossoming is cut short, as we know it is Nature's plan that when the plant has fulfilled its work of producing seed, it dies. So I always keep mine blooming by cutting freely of the flowers, especially asters and sweet peas. I have found of late years that the seeds from some of our seedsmen do not prove to be what the packet says they are; when that


