

More Than \$40,000,000 Decline in First Four Months of Year.

Canadian Press Despatch. Ottawa, Aug. 19. — A decrease of more than \$40,000,000 in the value of goods imported into Canada for con sumption in the Dominion during the first four months of the fiscal year, as compared with the same period in 1923-24, is shown in the trade state-ment issued through the customs department this morning.
