Charles Currie, of Akron, Ohio, and Cleveland, president of the London company, is said to be in charge of the arrangements, though it is probable that the bus company will be an entirely separate corporation. Mr. Currie is associated with the Northern Ohio Traction and Light Company, which has for some time made extensive use of motor buses in various urban centers, especially

Ohio Traction interests were among the first to recognize the trend toward the use of buses and to test their value as a street railway auxiliary.




