

CANADA WILL LOSE BYNG AT END OF OFFICE TERM

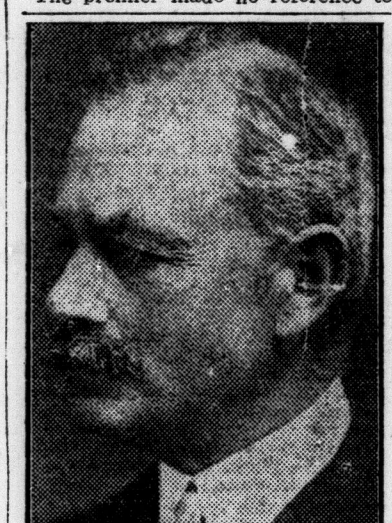
Hopes of Country Are Blasted When Premier King Announces in House That Baron Byng of Vimy Is Unable To Remain a Second Term As Governor-General.

Ottawa, June 12.—Baron Byng of Vimy will not remain for a second term as governor-general of Canada. The national hope that Byng would accede to popular demand and accept an extension of his term was given a setback in the House of Commons today, when Premier King, replying to a question from Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, leader of the opposition, intimated that his excellency would find it impossible to continue in office for another term.

The question of the dominion's governor-general was a topic of discussion in official circles two months ago, and sentiment strongly favored a deviation from accepted procedure in seeking a second term for Baron Byng. At that time, it was thought that, his excellency would see his way clear to remain in Canada for another four years.

In requesting the latest news on the matter, Mr. Meighen observed that

if his excellency could be persuaded to remain, the extension of his term would meet with universal approval. The premier made no reference to

DETROIT DROWNS MILE OFF PORT

Patrick J. Byrne, 42, Falls Overboard From City of St. Ignace.

Port Stanley, June 12.—Patrick J. Byrne, 42, of Detroit, Mich., a watchman on the steamer City of St. Ignace, fell overboard and was drowned about ten minutes after the vessel had cleared the light-house on her return trip to Cleveland yesterday afternoon. Although since then continuous search has been made, no trace of the body has been found.

Was Repairing Guard.
Byrne was in the act of repairing a fender guard that had been damaged as the steamer passed the light-house, and in so doing accidentally lost his footing and fell into the water. He was last seen swimming toward a life preserver that had been thrown him, but it is believed that he was sucked under by the swell of the steamer.

Captain Peterson of the St. Ignace stated this morning when the steamer docked here, that Byrne was outside of the main rail on the main deck standing on the fender guard endeavoring to pass a strap around the third fender on the starboard side, abreast of the freight gangway. The wash of the sea struck the fender causing it to swing back and hit Byrne, who became entangled between the fender and the bulwarks of the steamer. Losing his foothold on the fender he slipped into the water, and was last seen heading for the life preserver.

The St. Ignace left her dock at 12:30 on her return trip, and the first intimation harbor men had that something was wrong was when the steamer stopped in her course to lower lifeboats and soon after by the blowing of her distress whistle. The tug Wm. Davis, of the government construction fleet, and the Port Stanley lifeboat crew left immediately for the scene of the fatality, but could find no trace of the body. The St. Ignace, in charge of Captain Peterson, scoured the waters for over an hour, but her search also proved fruitless.

Bottle Thrown Out.
When the tug Wm. Davis reached the side of the steamer, the captain threw a bottle containing the following note to it, to be given to the custom officer here. The note read: "Man lost overboard. Please notify officials of the Western Reserve Navigation Company, Cleveland."

The scene of the fatality is about a mile from shore, directly in front of the casino. The lake was quite calm at the time, but it is believed that the man was caught in the swell of the steamer and carried under.

Mayor Not Keen For Nomination

Spurns Kindly Suggestion of Meighen Paper in His Behalf.

George A. Wenige, mayor of London, spurns the kindly offer made some days ago by a leading Meighen party newspaper whereby his worship was to secure the Liberal nomination for the constituency of London in the next federal election.

While the mayor has, with certain mental reservations, reformed from the more or less absolute policy of independence of which he is an erstwhile claimant, his present political statements run more towards high tariff and in opposition to the Liberal government's immigration policy. "You will be a Conservative candidate, then?" his worship was asked. The answer appeared to be negative. "Well, then, about Liberal-Conservative?" came a leading question. Still no positive answer. Just a chuckle and an air of abandon. His worship is continuing his "On-to-Ottawa" conferences, which have persisted during the last twelve months, and gives canny assurance that many roads lead to the capital.

BANK DEMAND FUNDS SHOW LARGE GROWTH

Increase in Call Deposits Is Shown by Ottawa Statement.

Ottawa, June 12.—Demand deposits held by Canadian banks showed an increase of over 20,000,000 at the end of April, as compared with the end of March. Savings deposits fell off by approximately \$2,000,000 during April and deposits outside Canada decreased by \$21,000,000.

The monthly statement issued by the finance department today reflecting the condition of the banks as on April 30 last shows that the amount of current loans in Canada held by the banks decreased by approximately \$3,000,000 during April, while call loans in Canada increased \$40,000,000. There was an increase of nearly \$28,000,000 during April in the amount of call loans held outside Canada.

WESTERN PROVINCES HAVE HEAVY RAINFALL

Manitoba and Saskatchewan Drenched by Downpours—Crops Are Improved.

Winnipeg, June 12.—Boosting the season's precipitation well above the average, a steady rainfall again drenched Manitoba generally and southern and central parts of Saskatchewan last night.

Districts around Virden, Man., were soaked in a downpour, which exceeded one inch, while Moose Jaw reported a heavy rainfall. During the last ten days the west has been liberally drenched and farmers throughout the prairie provinces intimate that sufficient moisture is now in the ground to tide the crops over for at least two or three weeks.

Prof. Morrow Gives Cheering Message to Kiwanis Club.

Not one of the 19 graduates of the department of commerce at the University of Western Ontario is in the United States. Such was the cheering message given to the Kiwanis club at its regular luncheon yesterday by Prof. Morrow, head of the department at the university.

Prof. Morrow further stated that of nine graduates this year eight of those desirous of securing positions had been able to do so and that the one United States job which was open was refused by one graduate after carefully considering the future there and in Canada. The professor expressed the hope that the commerce graduates would continue to remain in their native country and not trek to the United States as has been the case in other professions and trades. Prof. Morrow explained that there would not be any graduates from the commerce department at the local university next year because of the fact that the course has been extended from four years to one of five years.

Bridge Speed Low Slows Cars, But Black Horses—Try and Do It

Runaway Proves Right to Same Exemption As Big Red Fire Truck.

DRIVER STICKS

Auto Stops Buckboard's Wild Career—Man Escapes Injury.

"Five miles an hour there, fellows!" Many motorists have absorbed this blunt warning since a special speed enforcement officer stationed himself at the Ridout street bridge two days ago. But two branches of vehicular traffic pass unchallenged, speed no object. One is the fire truck section, the other the rarer runaway wing.

Early yesterday afternoon a fire truck roared over the five-miles-an-hour bridge at twenty miles an hour. Not long afterwards came a wild black steed pulling a buckboard, also hitting close to twenty. The invariable exceptions to the rule were proven in a few hours.

Races From South.
The excited charger raced down from the city and up the hill, and the natural runway leading to the structure. The captain was sticking to his ship, and by the time the bridge was reached the coal-black horse, the buckboard and the anxious driver were covering the ground in long, rabbit-like strides. Thames park spectators were seeing a sight that resembled a movie chariot race.

The speed cop surveyed the unwilling law-breakers, but the thrill of intercepting a runaway on a narrow road full of traffic did not strike him very forcibly, so he stood by ready to render assistance.

Aid Needed Soon.
Aid was needed before the bridge was spanned. Any aperture was right away to the horse, and he made a heroic attempt to plow between two automobiles. One auto revolved all the shock from the dusky charger, and he raced on; the driver was catapulted into the air, and the buckboard crumpled.

A survey of the stricken area revealed an angry motorist, a shamed-faced chariot driver, a grinning officer, but no casualties.

QUARTER-CENTURY-OLD PLANTS STILL BLOOM

Roses, Lilacs, Daffodils and Tulips Come Out in Splendid Array.

Flowers planted over 25 years ago in the vicinity of Briscoe street showed marvellous vitality this year by coming out in bloom. Tulip and Daffodil bulbs which were placed under the foot of soil and rose bushes and lilacs which were cut out ruthlessly came out this year in spite of the trimming-out work done by a resident of the neighborhood.

The flowers were originally planted on the old Meredith estate, which one time was a show place of London. When this estate was subdivided the flowers were not disturbed. But one person who thought that the plants had seen their day decided to destroy them. He dug out the bulbs and cut the roses and lilacs but little good he accomplished. They came out this year stronger than ever.

EARLY ACTION COMING IN CASE OF JOHN PIRIE

Slayer of Wife and Children Will Get Final Sanity Test.

The slayer of his two children and their mother was to have been executed in March, but strong representations having been made that Pirie was of unsound mentality a reprieve was granted until June 13.

An alienist examination of the prisoner, however, was made at the jail in Ottawa and it is understood that early next week a further and final test will be made by one or more experts on this last report of the minister of justice, the fate of the condemned man will largely depend.

FIRST EDUCATIONAL MEETING REAL SUCCESS AT ADELAIDE

The initial meeting of the educational series being held in West Middlesex proved a real success at Adelaide Village on Wednesday evening. The chairman, Harold Currie, secretary-treasurer of S. S. No. 4, Adelaide, for over 20 years gave the keynote when he stated that this was a real political meeting, because it was taking an interest in the affairs that concerned our homes and our country.

Dr. Karr brought the assurance of the minister and the department of their desire to co-operate with the trustees in an effort to solve our rural school problems. We have now the following opportunities for co-operation: 1.—Trustees of adjoining school sections where the attendance at one or both is small may arrange for the children to be all taught at one school; because of the arrangement of township and provincial grants, which makes the direct burden of keeping these small schools open

light, this is not taken advantage of, thus greatly increasing the cost of education. 2.—School boards may unite for the purpose of providing secondary schools; again, this has not proved workable. 3.—Groups of schools may unite for the purpose of providing part-time classes at certain times of the year suited to the community. While the need for these is apparent, the machinery is cumbersome and inadequate. 4.—A township council or group of schools may arrange for itinerant teachers of domestic science, manual training or agriculture. This has not been tried in Ontario, but it seems to be that the need for co-operation is great, but that the system, so virile 50 years ago, is now inadequate.

PAVING CUTS OFF MOTOR SHRINES

Longwoods Road and Hyde Park Highway Partly Closed.

Motorists are reminded that in arranging for Sunday trips in the vicinity of London, that the Hyde Park highway is closed from the end of the present paving at Cameron's side road to the Hyde Park side road. The Longwoods road is closed from Delaware to Strathburn, and the detour is via Mount Brydges and Komoka.

The Byron bridge is also closed to traffic while a new floor is being laid, and will remain closed for some five weeks. This means that motorists will have to forego one of the most popular of evening drives, a trip to Springfield via the Pipe Line road, returning over the Byron bridge and the river road on the north bank of the Thames.

The majority of the main travelled highways, such as the Pipe Line road, are thick with dust, and motorists are advised to use the back township roads as much as possible. Not only will they avoid much dust and gas, but they will travel through some very pretty country.

The Wishing Well near Komoka is becoming more popular every year. The best route to take is along the Pipe Line road to Byron, west to the Kilworth road, and take the first turn to the left after negotiating the Kilworth hill. This turn is about a mile west of the bridge.

CATHEDRAL WORK NOT YET ARRANGED

Conference Will Be Held To Decide On Color Schemes, Changes.

AUSTRALIA SHIPMENT OF FORDS IS STARTED

Company Sends First Consignment of Vehicles by Waterways Route.

The S. S. John C. Howard is loading 1,100 Ford cars, trucks and tractors at the Ford company's docks in Port City, Ont. This shipment is part of the first consignment to the company's new \$12,000,000 assembly plants now being erected in Australia. It is also the first time the docks have been used for exportation purposes.

The fact that the shipment will have to be transferred to an ocean vessel at Montreal has caused civic officials on both sides of the border to renew agitation for further investigation of the St. Lawrence waterway to the sea. With Canada spending \$80,000,000 upon the enlargement of the Welland canal, the arrival of an ocean ship from Cornwall, England, and a fleet of Swedish vessels reported as coming to the great lakes, agitation has again commenced for the great lakes waterway to the sea.

The American press, drawing attention to the above facts, queried: "Was there ever available anywhere a highway so completely prepared by nature and by man for the world water traffic as those lakes and the St. Lawrence?" These publications call for further investigations of the possibilities.
