"CLOSE FRIEND" ENTERS. Associated Press Despatch. Detroit, July 23.—An unnamed "close friend" of governor Len Small of Illinois has informed a local paper of his receipt of a message from the governor to the effect that a sixty day reprieve possible commutation of sentence would be granted by the governor to Scott on Thursday.

After investigation it was concluded to record the incident as an other miscarriage of plans to save Scott from the noose for the slaying of a drug clerk in Chicago. Little confidence was placed in the incident here, and it was discarded, but only after some excitement had been experienced by receipt of the message.

James M. Ball, perpetrator of the Russell Scott telegram hoax, has been declared sane by own request, examined him at his own request. Ball said he wanted proof of his sanity to lift what he said was a cloud which newspaper notoriety has cast on his mental state.

MANY NOTABLES WERE AT AVID GRANT'S PUPILS

Veteran Sarnia Teacher Has Guided Youths' Destinies For 42 Years.

HONORED BY CITY
Hundreds of Former Pupils Pay Tribute to Beloved Man.

Sarnia, July 23.—David M. Grant, veteran teacher in classics at the Sarnia collegiate institute, who was honored by hundreds of former pupils yesterday and presented with a purse of \$1,000, has taught school for 42 years, 40 years of which teaching has been in this city. There is no one of Sarnia's seventeen thousand residents who carries more respect and esteem than this veteran teacher, as the demonstration in his honor yesterday strikingly illustrated.

He has been more than a teacher almost a parent to hundreds of young people who have in four decades graduated from his classes. Mr. Grant is an honored graduate in classics from Toronto University. He was born in Wellington county and taught school at Oakwood and Petrolia before coming to Sarnia to the four roomed high school. His first pupil was the late Alex S. Burnham, former prominent Sarnia barrister, after Burnham came Judge R. Brown of British Columbia.

His pupils have in many cases distinguished themselves. J. R. Boyle is an ex-attorney-general of Alberta. John Brownlee is present attorney-general in that province. Elgin Gray is superintendent of Toronto General hospital. Herbert Symington, solicitor for the four western provinces. Percy Flintoff, solicitor for C. P. R. Chas. Adams, a king's counsel at Calgary. Mr. Justice Vanstone, prominent member of the New York stock exchange.

It was typical of Mr. Grant that at an interview he found many a pleasure in talking to those whom he taught in the early days than of himself. There is scarcely a prominent man in this city who did not emerge from the collegiate here and they all revere "D. M." as he is affectionately nicknamed. He has been a member of Sarnia library board for many years and is at present chairman. It will not be much longer, however, that D. M. will help younger Sarnians over the styles in the languages of the Greeks and Romans as early next year he will retire.

He says teaching has always been a delight to him, and as he moves around the city this week with his tall, erect figure still noticeable in any crowd, he finds a reward for his labors as he meets the eye and holds the hand of the ex-Sarnia collegians who have gravitated to the old town during the week.
