Thousands of Barrels of Fruit Are Frozen On the Trees.

WAVE IS SEVERE

Warmer Weather May Retrieve Part of Unharvested Crop.

Special to The Advertiser. Ingersoll, Oct. 30.-According to reports from the neighboring districts, there are thousands of barrels of apples frozen on the trees. In the opinion of many of the growers, the apples have been permanently damaged, and it is a question if an effort will be made to harvest any portion of the crop.

Of the more marketable varieties the Northern Spies predominate. One prominent grower of this district stated today that it was probably the earliest in 25 years or more that the West Essex, a gain from the Liberal apple crop had suffered so severely from frost.

It is probable that the damage

It is probable that the damage caused by the frost will enhance the value of the apples which have already been gathered. It was stated that as a rule the Spies are not harman to the state of Octovested until the latter part of October or early in November.

One grower in this section declared today that he had about 250 barrels of Spite on the total and the section of Spite on the section of Spite of Sp of Spies on the trees, and similar conditions are said to prevail in many other orchards. There is some speculation as to the effect that warmer weather, which would give the fruit an opportunity of thawing out gradually, would have on the unbaryested eron.
