PARTLY FAIR—A LITTLE WARMER.
Toronto, Feb. 29, 8 p. m. Snow last evening. A storm has moved very rapidly from the south-west states to the great lakes, driving violent gales, accompanied by snow, for the larger portion of Ontario, but rain near Lake Erie. In Quebec and the maritime provinces the weather has been fair and cold; also in the North-west Territories. Maximum and minimum temperatures: Dawson, 44 below; 28 below; Victoria, 32-38; Kamloops, 24-28; Calgary, 2 below; 41; Q'Appelle, 30-36; Winnipeg, 20-26; Port Arthur, 10-20; Toronto, 25-32; Ottawa, 12-20; Montreal, 10-18; Quebec, 6-25; Halifax, 16-24.

Probabilities:—Lakes—North-west and west winds; partly fair and a little milder. Georgian Bay—North and west winds; light local snowfalls, but clearing with a little higher temperature.

Local temperatures: The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the Observatory on Monday, Feb. 29th, 1904, were: Highest, 34 above; lowest, 25 above.

Date of Consecration.

Arrangements have been made whereby St. Mary's church at Walkerville, will be consecrated by Bishop Baldwin, of this city, on Sunday, April 10th. The contractors are putting forth every effort to have the church, school room and rectory ready for the ceremonies on the above mentioned date.

Y. W. C. A. Meeting

The Y. W. C. A. has instituted a series of monthly meetings of a musical, literary and historical character. On Saturday evening last, at the first of these, Miss Baldwin, contributed handsomely to the musical programme, while Miss Burgess gave a historical address on the Thibetan expedition, the present subject of interest in England.

A Vacancy Hard to Fill.

The Ontario Entomological Society will probably experience some difficulty in obtaining the services of a curator and librarian capable of filling the position as satisfactory as did the late Mr. Moffatt. The salary paid is only \$250 per year, but the late curator gave his whole time to the duties of the position, from pure love of the work.

L. N. S. Literary Society.

At the Normal School on Friday afternoon the regular meeting of the Literary Society was held. At 4:15 the chair was taken by President D. J. Leachery. The address by Mr. Ferguson, of L. C. I. staff, was a very interesting feature of the programme. Miss McBride and Miss L. Phoenix gave excellent solos. Master Webb, of Simcoe street Kindergarten, gave a pleasing solo and encore. Besides these an original poem was read by the poetess, Miss Hamilton, and the second part of the school paper was read by Miss Carol Perry.

The Vacant Solicitorship.

The Toronto Mail of yesterday has the following respecting the vacant solicitorship to the Ontario Treasury: "Mr. Alex. Stewart, K. C., of London, who refused the position, had been persuaded to reconsider the offer as the Premier is anxious that he should accept it. Mr. Stewart was formerly a partner of the Premier's son, Mr. Duncan Ross, barrister, of Stratford, and in some quarters it has been suggested that the latter be given the vacant office, but the Premier is understood to have intimated that he would not agree to any such arrangement."

All About Insects.

A lecture, under the auspices of the Young People's Society of Christ Church, was given in the school room, last night, by Rev. Dr. Bethune, on the subject of entomology. The lecture was illustrated by stereoscopic views. Dr. Bethune described various kinds of insects destructive, beneficial and otherwise. There was a good attendance, considering the inclemency of the weather, and the lecture was closely followed by the audience. The rector of the church, Rev. R. Howard, presided, and a pleasant evening was spent.

Fine Bill at The London.

There are three especially good acts at The London this week, and a large audience witnessed the opening of the third week of continuous vaudeville at this place last night. Larkins and Patterson scored the hit of the evening, coming from a week of success at The Temple, Detroit. The two do about the best "con" turn that has been seen here for many a day, the man being one of the blackest and smilingst of darky comedians, and the girl an octonion of more than passing beauty and sprightliness. In song and dance and repartee they brought down the house, and were

recalled time after time. Cherry and Bates, comedy cyclists, also put on a performance that evoked well deserved applause. Clever trick riding is combined with some first-class funny business. Trask and Gladder, who are designated the "Fashion Plates of Vaudeville," drew forth undivided approval by their graceful and dainty dancing and were repeatedly recalled, while the Great Roberts, prestidigitateur fairly amazed all beholders by his marvelous tricks with cards and handkerchiefs. The Leonard Sisters proved great favorites, their sketch, "An Unexpected Visitor," being excellently performed, and cordially received. The Kinetograph, the latest motion pictures, was undoubtedly a popular item. The Hatch Bros., who give a refined musical act, and Monte Bonou, acrobatic pantomime, who were last night delayed by the storm, will duly appear this evening.

Tea was served in the school room by the ladies, after which an adjournment was made to the church, where a programme was carried out. Rev. Mr. Grant, of St. Mary's, who preached anniversary sermons on Sunday, leading with a short address. The programme consisted of readings by Miss McTavish, solos by Mrs. Leute, Mr. Grant and Mr. Charles Turner, and choruses by the choir. The evening altogether was most enjoyable, and was voted as one of the most successful anniversary celebrations in the history of the church.

The music for the occasion was ordered by the Academy orchestra, and at midnight the guests adjourned to the supper room, where Caterer Peters was in charge.

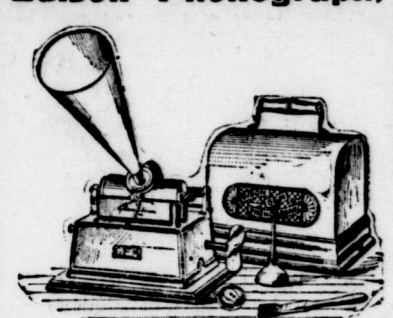
