The farmers' interests' have been the most neglected of any class of the community, and it was to aid them that the local farmers' institutes were established to spread agricultural editention and it was for the same purposes that the great central body was formed. As tokens of the work done by the Central Institute he pointed out that the body's influence was the chief cause of a practical farmer being appointed of Ontario Minister of Agriculture, and he followed this up by paying a high compliment to the ability of Hon.
