### COMMITTEE WILL DRAFT TAX PLAN

Business Men's Organizations Hold Conference at Toronto

ADVICE FOR DRAYTON

Delegates To-Day to Consider "Made-in-Canada" Campaign

TORONTO, March 30.—(Associated Press Dispatch)—After a lengthy joint conference on the question of federal taxation here to-day, in which representatives of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, the Wholesale Grocers' Association, the Wholesale Grocers' Trust Association and the Retail Merchants' Association of Canada took part, a joint committee was appointed to draft a plan of taxation to be presented and discussed at a further conference to-morrow. The conference also will deal with the question of the best methods to adopt for increasing the sale of Canadian-made goods so as to overcome the adverse trade balance between Canada and other countries, and to provide more work for the people of Canada.

MAKE BEST OF IT.  
The inevitable unpopularity of taxes was hit off by J. H. Douglas, wholesale clothing manufacturer, of Hamilton, who declared: "Whatever form of taxation the Government may introduce will be objectionable. However," he added, "we will have to make the best of it." The Government had to seek new forms of taxation, he said, and the manufacturers and merchants were expected to suggest a form of taxation on an equitable and just basis—a form that would cover consumers and the community in general.

J. Walsh, manager of the traffic department of the C. M. A., submitted a plan as follows:

"That the business profit war tax shall not be re-enacted.

"That the revenue war tax as regards corporations shall be repealed.

"That the sales war tax now in effect in Canada shall be amended, and extended sufficiently to provide the necessary revenue required by the Government."

In support of his plan Mr. Walsh said that a committee of the C. M. A. had had the matter under consideration for a year and had gathered information from all over the world.

AGAINST LUMP SUMS.  
T. W. Learie, of the Credit Men's Association, opposed taxation in lump sums. He said that the penalties prescribed in connection with the Sales Tax Act were made of a confiscatory character there would be very few retailers, manufacturers or importers, who would attempt to evade it.

The retailers presented a strong case for the levying of taxation at the source of supply, some features of which appealed to the manufacturers and importers. It was generally agreed that the Government had to devise new methods of raising revenue. The opinion was expressed that the farmers' income tax had been a failure.

D. V. Simclair, of Belleville, declared that he had come to the conclusion, after years of thinking the matter over, that it was the consumer who paid the tax, not the manufacturer or retailer.

J. A. Banfield, Winnipeg, declared that the retailer did not wish to shift his duty to the Government, and the little merchant should pay his share of taxes as well as the big seller.

Mr. Banfield asserted that the farmers of the West were paying their taxes, but the farmers in the East were not.

He criticized the Government's management of the Canadian merchant marine and complained that the Government had imported engines from Buffalo for launches when these could have been purchased in Canada.

### N. Y. STATE SENATOR SAYS LIFE THREATENED

Claims Opponents of Bill to Regulate Money Order Business Are Desperate.

ALBANY, N. Y., March 30.—Charges that his life had been threatened, that offers of bribes had been made to him, and that a powerful lobby was trying to defeat his bill designed to bring under the jurisdiction of the state superintendent of banks steamship and express companies doing a money order business, were made by Senator Acotillo (Democrat, New York), to-day, during the debate on the measure.

The senator said the steamship and express companies, through their hundreds of branch agencies, conducted a money transmitting monopoly. At least 250,000 foreign-born residents of the state, he said, hold receipts for undischarged money which they had entrusted to the agents of these corporations for transmission abroad.

Sub-agents of the Cunard Steamship Company and other steamship and express companies, he said, recently raised a fund of \$200,000 with which to fight his bill and other protective measures in the columns of the foreign language press of New York City.

### AGAINST CADET CORPS IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Brantford Traders and Labor Council Passes Resolution of Protest.

BRANTFORD, March 30.—(Special to The Free Press)—A protest against a system of public school cadets being again introduced throughout the schools of the city, was presented at a meeting of the Trades and Labor Council to-night. The council had previously protested against such a measure and was opposed to compulsory military training in the schools.

A resolution was passed protesting against the use of Dominion police officers to maintain law and order during the strike at the plant of the Beaver Board Company at Thorold.

Certain health conditions in two of the schools of the city were discussed and the Board of Health will be asked to investigate them immediately.

### IMPEACHMENT OF GOVERNOR IS URGED

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., March 30.—Impeachment of Governor Robertson was recommended in a report filed in the House of Representatives late to-day by an investigation committee. The report charges gross neglect and corruption in office.

The report also charges the governor with "unwarranted use of his executive power" in regard to pardons and paroles, declaring the present administration has extended clemency to 1,800 prisoners.

The charge is also made in the report that the governor evaded payment of his state income tax last year.

### BRITISH MINERS LIKELY TO STRIKE

Men Will Probably Cease Work To-Morrow

NEGOTIATIONS PENDING

But Union Executive Has Decided on Strike Call

LONDON, March 30.—(Associated Press Cable)—A coal strike seems inevitable on April 1, when the notices of the mine owners of a termination of contracts in order to enforce a reduction in wages will expire. The executive of the Miners' Federation met to-day and resolved to instruct all branches of the miners' union to cease work.

The executive then interviewed Sir Robert Home, president of the Board of Trade. The members demanded that the Government subsidize the industry so as to enable it to pay wages greater than the present profits, and also advocated the pooling of profits for the benefit of less profitable mines.

Sir Robert, on behalf of the Government, declined to consent to a subsidy. He said that most of the other great industries were in a worse position than the coal mines and that it was impossible for the Government to provide such help.

Herbert Smith, vice-president of the Miners' Federation, on behalf of the miners' executive, then informed Sir Robert of the decision to withdraw all workers, including pump men and engineers, from the pits.

Sir Robert rejoined that this was a grave decision and that he hoped before adopting such a course the miners would reconsider. He offered to meet the miners' executive at any time to-morrow.

The executive of the Triple Alliance, made up of the miners, the railway and the transport workers, held a private preliminary meeting to-day. This executive will reassemble to-morrow to discuss its course of action.

### CAN OPERATE RADIALS CHEAPER

Expert Compares Them With Motor Busses

AT THE HYDRO PROBE

Motor Truck Business Dropping Off in United States

TORONTO, March 30.—(Canadian Press Dispatch)—Motor busses are more costly to operate than radial railway cars, according to evidence given here to-day before the royal commission inquiring into the radial railway scheme of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission by Walter Jackson, of Mount Vernon, N. Y., consultant on electric railway and motor bus services. He placed the cost per diem of a five-ton truck doing 100 miles per diem, including all the costs, investments, amortization, etc., at \$60, and said the cost of a 30-mile round trip on the Toronto-Hamilton highway would be more than this, rather than less. The cost of a seat mile on a motor bus, he said, was practically double that of a tram-car seat mile.

On the question of a motor bus competition with an electric railway, Mr. Jackson said that a motor bus company could not possibly carry passengers at 2 1/2 cents a mile, no matter how much business it might get. Motor truck business for long hauls had very materially dropped off in the United States since the war, Mr. Jackson said. He claimed that the operation of electric railways for freight hauling purposes was more economical than the operation of steam railways on account of the greater flexibility of the former, which could put on smaller or larger locomotives, according to the weight of the train.

### FRANCE PROPOSES TO INCREASE ITS TARIFF

PARIS, March 30.—The Government will soon introduce in Parliament a revised maximum customs tariff list, which commercial experts understand will be equivalent to a wall against all imports except foodstuffs and metallurgical products.

The proposed increases apply only to the so-called maximum list, which has to do with all countries except those favored by the minimum tariff rates. These increases, it is reported, will show a difference between the minimum and maximum lists of from 100 to 200 per cent.

OTTAWA, March 30.—Canada will benefit partially by the provisions of the minimum list classification, Sir George Foster, minister of trade and commerce, said to-night. The minimum rate will apply to all articles cited in the Franco-Canadian treaty, lately negotiated by Sir George and brought down in the Commons yesterday.






