

## ALBERTA REJECTS RESOURCES OFFER

Will Not Accept Ottawa's Plan  
of Settlement

### DECISION OF CABINET

Claims Compensation For Lands  
Taken For Federal Purposes

EDMONTON, Nov. 29.—(Associated Press Dispatch.)—Alberta does not find the Dominion Government's offer on natural resources satisfactory and will not accept it as a settlement of the question. This decision was reached at a meeting of the Cabinet on Tuesday, when Premier Greenfield reported the results of the recent conference in Ottawa. The other members of the Government concurred.

compensation for such of its resources as have been alienated for federal purposes, its claim being based particularly on the 6,400,000 acres disposed of, shortly prior to the creation of the province, for federal purposes.

This land, capitalized at the rate of \$1.50 per acre and repaid in annual installments for a term of years, would approximately equal the present cash subsidy for 10 years, instead of the three years offered by Hon. Mackenzie King.

## VARI-COLORED BOOTHS AT ST. JOHN'S BAZAAR

Tucked away in a corner was a unique and attractive art booth, pretty with its covering of morning glories, where, along with brightly hued everlasting flowers, little parrots made from peanuts and other novelties were quickly snapped up by eager purchasers.

"Ye Bluebird Shoppe," true to its name, was covered with bluebirds, and contained many dozens of pretty handkerchiefs, which found a ready sale. Brilliant in red and green with red crimson flowers and tall green candles in red holders was the monster home-cooking booth, where quantities of delectable good things were on sale.

Green parrots on a striking red background drew instant attention to the candy booth, where novelty bags and baskets contained the ever popular sweets. Separated by an archway from the main hall, one of the classrooms had been transformed into a charming tea-room, where, at a long table prettily arranged with shaded lights and yellow candles in silver candlesticks, and centered with bronzes baby nuns, tea was served by Mrs. Jeeves and Mrs. H. P. MacMahon. Tea was served at small tables decorated with golden flowers, which were constantly filled with visitors.

Mrs. A. R. Bough, president of the guild, who was general convener, in charge of the booths, gave a gracious welcome to the many guests. The bazaar will also be open this afternoon and evening.

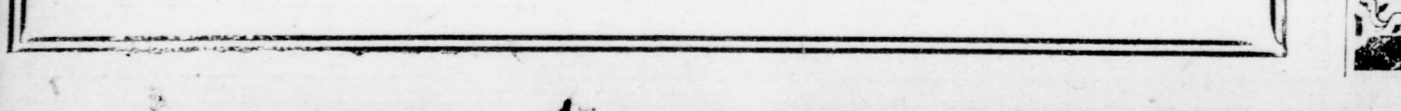
