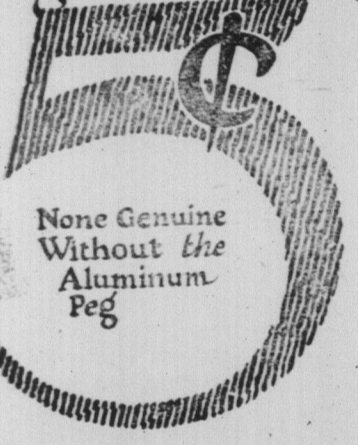

MRS. AVIS SMITH HARDWICKE
The death occurred at her residence on St. George St., Annapolis, October 12th, of Mrs. Avis Smith Hardwicke, widow of the late R. Leslie Hardwicke, for many years Town Steward, in the 82nd year of her age. She was a daughter of the late Sidney Smith Saunders, of Lequille, and a grand daughter of David Eason, one of the original settlers of this community. She leaves one sister, Mrs. Fannie Ritchie, of Lequille, and four children: Mrs. R. D. Foster, Mrs. Messenger, Mrs. Gosner and R. L. Hardwicke, one brother Sidney, of Acadiaville, Digby Co., all of whom were present at the funeral which took place from the house at three p.m. on Saturday with service conducted by Rev. T. A. Mellor, Rector of the parish, who spoke feelingly and sympathetically on the subject of Christ's wonderful grace given in the time of suffering.

The hymns chosen were: "There is no night in Heaven," "Come unto Me, ye weary and I will give you rest," words which were frequently on Mrs. Hardwicke's lips during the last days of her illness, and "Abide With Me."

A kindly old lady, Mrs. Hardwicke was all her life, identified with the interests of the community and was one of the passing generation whose deeds will be gratefully remembered by her descendants and many friends.
