As hon. members realize, there is a wish to dispose of the omnibus bill affecting various loans acts, and I would call this later in the week. Probably tomorrow we will begin with the Old Age Security Act, unless further consultation might lead to the conclusion that a very small amount of time would be spent in clearing that omnibus bill. In that event, I would call it first and then proceed with the Old Age Security Act, but that would not be done without further consultation.
