

FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS NEEDED

Memorial to General Booth Will Be Erected in Toronto in the Near Future.

WILL COST A LARGE SUM

Salvation Army Will Raise a Quarter of the Amount and Remainder Will Be Subscribed.

Commissioner Rees, head of the Salvation Army in Canada, has issued the following statement concerning the Canadian Memorial to be built in Toronto, to the life and work of General William Booth, the founder of this world-wide organization: The Memorial is to take the form of a training school for social workers, thereby bringing into existence the institution that is to train the officers doing the work as outlined in the late General's social scheme. Various branches have been established, and the work is being done, but in order to realize greater efficiency, special training is required. In Canada there are seventy such institutions. When I saw General Booth in London last year, a few days before he passed away, this was one of the subjects of our conversation. The dying General said to me, "This is the one unrealized desire of my heart, and I am relying upon you to make it a fact, so far as Canada is concerned."

The members of the Salvation Army are doing their part, and have assumed the responsibility to raise fifty thousand dollars. The entire cost of the building will be according to present plans, in the neighborhood of two hundred thousand dollars. One-half of the required amount will be raised in Toronto, as the building will be erected here. General Bramwell Booth, in a message to Canadian social workers concerning the Memorial, says, "I am happy to know that Canada will follow the motherland in the choice of the form the Memorial to take. I know this would please my father right."


