

FINE RECEPTION FOR GEORGE HENRY

Conservative Candidate Welcomed by the Electors of Danforth District.

LIBERAL AID OFFERED

To Mr. Henry by Voters Out of Sympathy With the Rowell Policies.

Geo. S. Henry, the Conservative candidate in East York, was again heartily received and cheerily endorsed by a well attended meeting in Player's Hall, Danforth, last night. Charles Dougherty occupied the chair, and addresses were delivered by W. F. Maclean, M.P., Hon. R. A. Pyne, Hon. James Duff, T. H. Lennox, M.L.A., and the candidate.

Discussing his campaign expenses in the riding, Mr. Henry said that the "abolish the bar" policy was evidently going to meet a similar fate in East Toronto to that it met in North Grey. He promised to vote for him, because they were out of sympathy with the present Liberal policy.

The taxation of land values, he said, had been a good deal of experience with assessment, and it seemed to him that it was not so much a matter of the regulations contained in the act as the difficulty of getting assessors to properly interpret its meaning. They were authorized to assess the value of improvements, but it was not intended that they should be taken as a basis of improvement in the case of farm property.

Two Ministers Speak. Hon. James Duff said there had been a lot of claptrap talked of late, and exodus of population in Ontario, and that the young men and women to the west, a recent visit had proved to him that the recent improvements in agricultural education and development in the west were not to be despised.

"I can imagine a better government than we have in Ontario at this moment, that we have in Canada, and that a better government, and Mr. Henry is going to support that government, and help to support a success of the many progressive measures under way."

Ontario was fortunate, he said, in having a government that administered the law and made everyone obey the law, and in Mr. Henry Duff, who was a candidate who understood the needs of the suburbs, the townships, the country, and the farmers.

The pool is a large one with concrete sides and bottom and grades from a few feet to eight inches in depth. It is supplied with the cool mineral water which bubbles from the spring near the sanitation, and is emptied, and cleaned daily. Lockers are provided for a nominal fee, and the bath, which is now in the open air, will be covered in the winter months.

During the four corresponding months of the last fiscal year the number was 209,662, composed of 29,102 British, 59,040 American and 60,424 from all other countries. The increase is twenty per cent.

LARGE EXTENSIONS FOR ANGUS SHOPS

C. P.R. Will Also Build Big Car Shops at McAdam Junction, N.B.
