CHURCH CORPORATION WILL BUILD HOUSES

One Hundred Thousand Dollars to Be Spent in Regina Experiment.

The Roman Catholic Episcopal Corporation at Regina has taken steps toward the erection of a block of workmen's cottages, a cost about \$100,000. It is expected that 300 men at least will be employed in erecting these cottages, which will be rented to tradesmen and mechanics in Regina at a low rate. The city has promised to install the necessary water and sewer connections. The houses will be fully modern in every respect, containing seven rooms and bath and heated by hot-water furnaces.
