WILLARD MATCHED | CONNIE MACK GIVES TO FIGHT FULTON

Challenger is Guaranteed Rube Oldring Returns With Twenty Thousand Dollars -Meet Independence Day.

Kansas City, Mo., March 15.—Jess Willard, heavyweight champion, and Fred Fulton of Rochester, Minn., aspirant to the title, will meet in the ring July 4, Col. J. C. Mäller of Oklahoma, promoter, announced tonight. Colonel Miller said that Fulton had been guaranteed \$20,000 and that there would be a side bet of \$5000.

When Mike Collins, manager for Fred Fulton of Minnesota, aspirant to the heavyweight championship title, left here for Minneapolis late today, the decision as to whether Fulton and Jess Willard, present titleholder, were to be matched with Col. J. C. Miller had been in conference since yesterday with Collins trying to reach an agreement.

Collins at the final conference rejected Miller's flat offer of fifteen thougand dollars and declared that to reach an agreement Fulton would have to be guaranteed one-fourth of the sum Willard would receive.

Miller announced that he had sent a telegram to Willard at Jacksonville, Fla., and that "he expected an answer soon." Miller also declared that the believed an agreement would be reached ahd the men signed.

As a guarantee of good faith, it was announceed. Miller and Collins each deposited cheques for \$1000 with Edward W. Cochrane, a Kansas City sporting editor.

The match, Miller said, would automatically cancel the proposed bout between Fulton and Jack Dempsey at Atlantic City, N.J., part of the agreement being that Fulton would not fight again until he meets Willard.

"We propose to hold the fight wherever the law allows a long bout," Miller said.

"We feel that it should be not less than twenty rounds and many states prohibit contests of that length. Willard has told me he is willing to fight to a finish."

At the conference on April 1, in addition to choosing the place for holding the match and determining its length, the officials also will be agreed upon, Miller said.
