Toronto Junction, Jan. 17 .- Two of the rooms of the Carlton-street school had to be dismissed to-day on account of the low temperature. Samuel Tansley, a C.P.R. brakeman,

lost his life this morning while shunting at the siding of Moffatt's stove factory, between here and Weston. While pulling out of the siding five cars became detached from the rear While pulling out of the siding five cars became detached from the rear end. Tansley, who was with the front end, reached over to turn the angle cock, while the rear cars run upon him and jammed him between the draw bars, completely crushing him about the abdomen. He died almost instantly. The deceased had been in the employ of the C.P.R. for a short time. He was formerly employed on the city and suburban railway, and lived at 130 East Queen-street.
