LONG TRIP IN A BALLOON. Two Frenchmen Have Traveled 1304 Miles in the Air-Time

36 Hours. New York, Oct. 12.—The closing compet ion in the exhibition balloon matches will live long in the history of aeronautics says a Paris despatch to The Herald. One says a Paris despatch to The Heraid. One, at least, of the competitors has far out-distanced any previous officially recorded aerial voyage. A telegram just received from The Figaro's correspondent in Klew, Russia, announces the arrival of the balloon Centaure at a spot beyond that city. Comte Henry De La Vaulx is the record-breaker. He was accompanied on his journey by Comte Castillon de Saint Victor, who held the previous balloon record of 1370 kilometres, from Paris to Westerwick. The Klew voyage took 36 hours. The distance of 1370 kilometres is measured as the crow files, The distance between Paris and Klew is 2100 kilometres (1304 miles).

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


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
