



As to mineral resources there are vast deposits of iron in proximity to the bay shores. There are large areas of arable land in the district. Says Mr. Charlton: "I believe that the immense territory lying between Temiscamingue and Ab bitibe, westerly and northerly to the great Albany River, is of sufficient importance to this province in land, timber and mineral wealth to warrant the
