The Distinguished Service Order was conferred on Major Gordon Atkins, Winnipeg, who constantly visited the front line as brigade captain, traversing a heavy barrage and organizing the conveyance of ammunition and evacuating the wounded.

NO DISCRIMINATION

Act Will Be Lived Up To-Many Expected To Appear in Court.

A copy of the order-in-council of April 6, which makes it compulsory for every male person between the ages of 16 and 60 residing in Canada to engage Williams. The document was mailed

Williams. The document was malled from the offices of the department of justice, Ottawa, and gives Chief Williams the authority to enforce the provisions of the new act.

Although action has been taken in several other cities in Ontario. Chief Williams has declined to act to the present, claiming he had no authority until a copy of the act was received from Ottawa.

Instructions will be issued to all the members of the police today to round up men who cannot prove that they are engaged regularly in some useful work. Men suspected of not being engaged in some useful work will have a chance to explain why they are not so engaged. The magistrate will decide whether the occupation in which any individual brought into court is engaged is useful work or not.

The court's interpretation of useful work may be a rude shock to some men who now think their occupation is useful, whereas the magistrate may rule differently. "The act will be enforced in London, you may depend upon that, and there will be no discrimination, either," said Chief Williams.


