

The damage to shipping and the port's equipment is of a very serious character: windows and doors everywhere were shattered to pieces, and in many streets outside of the ruined district houses were partially wrecked. But in the areas which, at closer range, came inder the full force of the explosion, every building of every class was completely destroyed, and fire in many cases finished the work of the explosion. It is estimated that at least 1,500 dwellings and their contents have been wiped out of existence, as many more partly dend from 10.000 to 20.000 rendered homeless. It is feared that as many as 2,000 persons were killed.
