

O. H. F. Q .- How could I find out my brother's military number, and regiment in the United States army? He was on the Mexican border two years ago.

A .- Write to Secretary of War, Washington, D. C., U. S. A., giving his Q. M. S. Christie. They proceed to full name and age. If you can also Siberia after training is completed, and state what regiment he served with on will leave Canada as a signalling corps. the Mexican border it will facilitate locating him.

Those chosen to go are: Sappers James Arthur Baker, George Arthur Bennett, SUBSCRIBER. Q.-1. Having been re-examined lately and placed In category E, can I now obtain my discharge papers?
2. If not should I receive papers showing that I am now in category E?

A.—1. No. You should be exempted until men of category E are called.

2. You should receive exemption papers stating that you are in category E. Write to the Deputy Registrar, Royal Bank Bullding, London, Ont., applying for exemption as a category E man, and you will no doubt receive the proper documents in return.

W. A. R. Q.—1. From whom can a form for exemption claim be obtained and when should requests for such consideration be sent in?

2. I was placed in category E last January, but recently on re-examination was placed in category A. For the last four months I have been employed in a large Detroit ordnance plant, manufacturing munitions? I am almost thirty years of age and wish to claim exemption. How should I proceed?

3. Will men who were raised from category E to A be ordered to report before those who were placed in categories B, C and D last January?

FRIEND. Q.—I know of a kind old lady who has a son in the army. He has served for three years, and she is a widow 60 years of age. She had her arm broken, and is trying to work for a living. She adopted the boy and he enlisted under his adopt-

ed name. She is now living in the United States. Would she have to come to Canada to receive any money from the Canadian Government?

2. Is she entitled to any money from the Canadian Government?

from the Canadian Government?

3. If so, would she receive any back money from the time he enlisted?

4. Where would she apply for this money? money?
A.-1. No. Her case would be decided

A.—1. No. Her case would be decided upon by the authorities, and if she were found entitled to the money it would be sent to her in the United States.

2. If her son was her sole support prior to enlistment, she is entitled to \$25 per month separation allowance, provided month separation allowance, provided that he assigns to her at least \$15 per month of his pay.

3. If she is found to be entitled to this allowance she will receive it, dating back to the day of her son's enlistment.

4. She should write to the Paymaster I General, S. A. and A. P. Branch, Ottatawa, and a form will be sent to her to fill in as an affidavit, with particulars regarding her financial condition and

regarding her financial condition and the enlistment of her son.

READER. Q.—Have you any information as to when the 19-year-old draft will be called?

2. Would a youth 19 years of age, beginning a faculty course on October 1 have any chance to finish the course, which ends in June, 1919?

3. Can one be examined in London without enlisting if he is fit?
