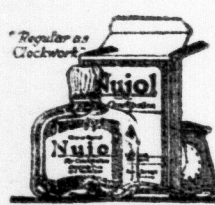

HIGHER SALARIES ATTRACT MEMBERS OF FACULTY OF S. A. C.

Resignation of Prof. Wade
Toole To Editor Farm
Paper Reported.

WILHELM, Feb. 19.—The first of the rumored resignations of members of the faculty of the S. A. C. materialized today when Prof. Wade Toole, head of the animal husbandry department, placed his resignation in the hands of President Dr. Creelman, the sum to take effect on May 1. The resignation did not come as a great surprise, as a number of his friends were aware of his intentions some days ago.

Prof. Toole is leaving the college to accept a better offer and will return to the journalistic field, the O. A. C. thereby losing a valuable man who could have been retained had the salary inducement been sufficiently tempting. He has accepted the position of managing editor of the Farmers Advocate at Winnipeg.

Other Resignations.
There are rumors of several other resignations at the college, in fact one or two have already been sent in. Jack Neil, who has been assistant to Prof. Leitch in the department of farm management, has resigned and will join the staff of the Farmers' Magazine at Toronto.

Crow of the horticultural department, and Prof. W. R. Graham of the poultry department, and Prof. Miller of the dairy department, have all received good offers of other positions and are contemplating leaving the college in a short time.

WATERWAYS PROJECT
TO BE DISCUSSED

SARNIA, Feb. 19.—E. C. Barre, at the meeting of the Sarnia Chamber of Commerce for election purposes, was elected president. The officers for the ensuing year are: H. F. Holland, first vice-president; Thomas Grace, second vice-president; W. R. Paul, treasurer; George Gabler, recording secretary.

The Great Lakes waterway project was brought up for discussion at the session, and it was decided by the members to call a general meeting in the near future, which will be addressed by members of the Great Lakes Waterways and Power Association.

A program for 1920 has been outlined by the Chamber of Commerce officials, and every effort will be made by the newly-elected officers to continue the record-breaking work of the old office holders.

PUBLIC GATHERINGS ARE FREED FROM FLU BAN

INGERSOLL, Feb. 19.—Public gatherings are once more permissible here, the ban which was imposed by the medical officer of health following the influenza epidemic having been raised today. There has been a big falling off in the number of serious cases in town, and the situation has shown steady improvement since the beginning of the week. Medical Officer of Health Dr. McDonald has emphasized that there will continue to be cases of the disease for some time yet, and while citizens have co-operated to a marked degree during the last two weeks, that precautionary measures should not be relaxed. Generally there is a very optimistic feeling, and it would seem that the peak of the outbreak was passed last week.

Relations here have been appraised of the death at Port Huron, Mich., of J. P. Barker, who was widely known in Ingersoll, having for some years been in the G. T. R. freight office, and since his removal to Port Huron had made regular visits here.

Recent news of the storm of the early part of the week was the most severe in recent years. Country residents have been kept busy opening roads, and in many places the drifts are said to be ten feet high. The north and south roads have been impassable in some places.
