

PRESBYTERIAN SYNOD

Having spent the day in discussing temperance and moral reform and French evangelization, the Presbyterian Synod of Toronto and Kingston finished its work yesterday afternoon. Prohibition was the ultimate end to be aimed at, according to the resolution passed by the synod, but this could only be attained by the education of public opinion. As intermediate steps, however, the synod pledged itself to work for local option and the abolition of the bar. It also put itself on record as opposed to the three-fifths clause.
