MRS. MOHR ACQUITTED NEGROES FOUND GUILTY Mrs. Fro

Pay for Murder of Husband.

PROVIDENCE, R.I., Feb. 6.—Mrs Elizabeth F. Mohr was acquitted last night by a jury in the supreme court of a charge of having instigated the murder of her husband, Dr. C. Frankhr Mohr. C. Victor Brown, and Henry H. Srellman, who were accused of the H. Spellman, who were accused of the actual killing, were found guilty. The

actual killing, were found guilty. The jury was out seven hours.

The trial began Jan, 10 and the jury had been kept together all the time. Dr. Mohr. a physician practising in this city and Newport, was shot fatally on the evening of Aug. 31, 1915, as he was sitting in his stalled automobile in a lonely snot in Barrington. bile in a lonely spot in Barrington. Chauffeur Revealed Plot.

George W. Healis, the chauffeur, made a confession in which he alleged that Mrs. Mohr had agreed to pay him, Brown and Spellman, \$5000 if they would murder her husband.

The police also claimed that the two other negroes made confessions which other negroes made confessions which were subsequently repudiated. Healis pleaded guilty to manslaughter and became a witness for the state.

Dr. and Mrs. Mohr had been living apart for two years as a result of quarrels growing out of his alleged at-tentions to Miss Burger and other women. Separation suits were pend-ing, and the state claimed that Mrs. Mohr sought her husband's death for revenge and to obtain his estate. The defence maintained that Mrs. Mohr loved her husband and that she had been involved by the actual murderer, who hoped thus to mitigate his own I-unishment.

A. R. CREELMAN DEAD

Was General Counsel and a Director of the Canadian Pacific Railway

A. R. Creelman, K.C., one of the most eminent lawyers in Canada, died at his home, 694 Sherbrooke street, Montreal, yesterday in his 67th year. His last active work in the legal profession was as general counsel for the Canadian Pacific Railway, of which he was a director at the time of his death. The late Mr. Creelman retired two years ago and he had been in failing health since May last.

During his career, he was one of the founders of the firm of McCarthy, Osler, Hoskin and Creelman in this city. The late D'Alton McCarthy was his first partner and he was joined later by the late B. B. Osler, K.C., and Dr. John Hoskin. In those days his services were specially in demand as counsel in fire insurance and the-ber limit litigation. In 1901, he be-came general solicitor for the C.P.R., later being made general counsel and

WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head or a family, or any ma over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alland in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (out not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Dutles—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, on certain condi-

at least eighty acres, on certain condi-tions. A habitable house is required, ex-cept where residence is performed in the vicinity.

vicinity.
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead Price, \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent, also fifty acres extra cuitivation.

patent, also fifty acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of the three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
