

At right angles to the main hall is a second hall seven ft. wide with an entrance from a portico with two large pillars, situated on the right side of the building and reached by an ascent of five stone steps.

On the left of this hall is a fine room, 32 ft. by 17 ft. 6 inches, which is to be used as the schoolroom. At the end of this hall is a bath room, the walls of which are sheathed 4 ft. in stained ash, and the doors and windows in light mahogany. To the right is a gentleman teacher's sitting room. On the left of this hall is a third hall 3 ft. 6 inches wide, which gives egress to the playground for the boys, whose sitting room opens into it.

From the second hall a staircase leads into the basement, 65 ft. by 56 ft. which contains pupils' dining room, 33 ft. by 18 ft. kitchen, laundry, pantry, scullery, dairy, storerooms, wood and coal cellars, and two furnaces heat the building.

The upper floors were sufficiently described in our last report.

The two porticoes have been surmounted with an iron balustrade, which gives a pleasing finish to the work.

A substantial barn 44 ft. by 35 ft. has been erected 100 ft to the left and back of the main building, with shingled roof and sides, divided into four divisions of 11 ft. by 35 ft., for barn floor, carriage shed, harness room, and stables for horses and cattle, with large upper floor for storing hay, oats etc.

The following suggestions, if carried out, would, I have no doubt, add considerably to the children's comfort and happiness.

The piece of ground, about half an acre in extent, in front of the barn, and extending to the brook on the left, and to the road which leads in front of the main building, can be laid out as a fruit and flower garden. The level piece of ground of about an acre, which extends from the brook to the edge of the woods on the north side of the flower garden, can be made into a splendid cricket and baseball ground for the boys.

The piece of ground to the right of the house and formerly used as a garden, can be made into a play ground for the girls, where their swings, hammocks, etc., can be put up.
