CHESEA HAD ANOTHER SERIOUS BLAZE TODAY

Nearly an Acre of Buildings Swept Away and Damage is \$350,000--Two Wisconsin Towns Wiped out by Forest Fires--Conditions in Maine.

Chelea, Mass., Sept. 21. Nearly an acre of wooden buildings on the north side of the Boston and Maine tracks in this city which escaped the conflagration of April 12, were swept away today by another disastrous fire, entailing a loss of \$300,000.

The boundaries of the fire are west 3rd street, the Boston and Maine tracks, Everett street and Carter street.

Chelea, Mass., Sept. 21.—The destruction by fire of the large box factory of Atwood and McManus on Vale street at 8 a. m., today, and the extension of the flames to the lumber yard of Pope and Cottle on Carter street, in a district which was not reached by the great fire of last April, caused a general alarm in the city, and a call for help from both Boston and Everett.
