

Quarry Lot, containing 120 acres, is given to Thomas B. White in lieu of 550 acres given up by him out of the 750 to which he and his family are entitled; - This I consider a fair compensation for the Quarry Lot, if, as expected, the surrendered land, when brought to Sale, will realize an average price of about \$20.⁰⁰ per acre, - The present rent of the Quarry being \$500.⁰⁰ per annum, and generally considered to be all that it is worth, -

There appears to be a surplus of 550 acres, after making the proposed allotments, which, according to the resolutions of 5th July, they wish to divide and dispose of in the way of gifts to former female members of the Band who have married and gone out from the Reserve.

In regard to the case of Peter D. Clark and his wife, whom they wish, in the July resolutions, to cut off from sharing in the distribution, but afterwards, ^{as letter of 20 Aug 1873 from the Wyanadette} in making up the allotments, grant to him his present homestead on Lots 13 & 14 in the 1st Concession. I may refer you to official letters to me (C. 294) of 19th Nov 1866, and a previous letter of 17th July 1866, in which the late Deputy Sup^t Genl. seasons are decided in favour of the rights of said Peter D. Clark.

It will be observed that two 100 acre lots in Block B. are patented, these are occupied by white men, the present owners, and that Lots 13 & 14 in Block C are in occupation of Indians, these lots having at one time been sold, and the
