

Parabero, N. S., with a cargo of coal for  
the Canadian Pacific Railway.

the council will be held.

Captain E. Griffith is now in command  
of the C. P. R. steamship Monmouth at  
present in port, not Captain Ward, as re-  
ported. This is the second trip this season  
that Captain Griffith has brought the  
Monmouth here.

The funeral of the late William S. Rain-  
nie was held at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon  
from the residence of Mrs. Wm. Rainnie,  
88 Sewell street. Services were con-  
ducted by Rev. W. W. McMaster and Rev.  
David Lang and interment was made in  
Fernhill cemetery.

The valuation of the Allan line steamer  
Tunisian, now on her way to Liverpool is  
as follows: Canadian goods, \$118,229;  
United States goods, \$177,753. Total \$296,  
082. Among her cargo are 10,000 bushels of  
wheat valued at about \$85,000; also 2765  
packages American meats worth \$151,644.

held up. The captain is receiving the glad

He will leave here on the steamer Calvin  
Austin tomorrow morning for a visit to

## THE CITY WHARVES

Repairs to Eastern S. S. and Do-  
minion Atlantic Wharf About  
Completed -- The New West  
Side Wharf.

The work of repairing the damage done  
by the recent fire to the wharves and  
wharf under lease to the Eastern S. S.  
Co. is going ahead under the direction of  
Director Peters. The damaged wharf has  
been taken out and called and are now being  
recovered and re-limbered. It is expected  
they will be ready to put in place again  
in a couple of weeks if the weather is  
favorable.

The work of making changes in the D.  
A. E. wharf and another member of  
the building has been raised nine feet  
and a new freight room, express room  
and manager's office provided. The work  
leaving the present office, downstairs, to  
be used as a waiting room.

The office in the Senla's warehouse  
will be raised also, as soon as a letter is  
filed with the common clerk by the com-  
pany agreeing to pay 10 per cent of the  
cost.

It is understood that the minister of  
public works has abandoned the idea of  
building a concrete wharf on the west  
side, but will build according to the plans  
submitted by Engineer Peters. These  
provide for a wharf similar to the one  
already constructed.

## POLICE COURT

Only two prisoners were gathered in by  
the police last night and both were in  
court this morning.  
Morris Daley who was arrested on  
charges of assaulting and beating his bro-  
ther and sister and another member of  
the household, admitted having struck his  
brother, but denied the other charges

## Geo. R. McWha

St. Stephen, N. B., Feb. 18--(Special)--  
George R. McWha, aged fifty-two years,  
died this afternoon of tuberculosis. His  
daughter died of the same disease about  
two weeks ago.  
Mr. McWha has been poorly for some  
time but was around until about three  
weeks ago. He was a native of St. John,  
N. B., and was married to Mrs. Mary  
McWha, nee Raymond, of St. John.  
Kate, Alice, Eva, and Margaret, and  
son, Albert, at home, and another son,  
George, in Winnipeg.

Mr. McWha has been wharfing here  
for several years. He was a prominent  
member of Frontier Lodge, Knights of  
Pythias. The funeral takes place Thurs-  
day afternoon at 2:30 o'clock; interment  
in the rural cemetery.

## Mrs. Harry Lewis

The Daily Argosy, of Georgetown, Dem-  
erara, Jan. 1, refers at length to the  
death of Mrs. Harry Lewis, who was Miss  
Addie Isaac, daughter of A. Isaac,  
of this city, and whose death was refer-  
red to in the Telegraph some weeks ago.  
The Argosy says Mrs. Lewis died on Sat-  
urday, Jan. 18, "after a brief illness, the  
occurrence causing quite a shock among  
her friends and acquaintances. The de-  
ceased lady, who was the wife of Harry  
Lewis, had been indisposed for several days,  
necessitating the attendance of Dr. E. S.  
Masefield, under whose treatment she seem-  
ed to be making good progress towards  
recovery. But, unhappily, the patient took  
a turn for the worse, a sharp attack of  
fever intervening.

"The symptoms becoming alarming, Drs.  
Walshart and Neal were summoned in  
consultation. Afterwards Mrs. Lewis  
gradually sank until the end came at 12:10  
a. m. on Saturday. It was first thought  
that the deceased had been a sufferer  
from malarial fever, but a careful diagnosis  
by the three medical men indicated acute  
gastritis.

"Deceased was generally known among  
her numerous friends and acquaintances  
to be possessed of a very cheerful and  
amiable disposition, and thereby won the  
esteem and admiration of many friends  
from the day she arrived in the colony.  
Wherever she went the atmosphere was  
always bright and cheery for she was an  
excellent companion, full of fun and vi-  
vacity.

"Deceased's husband has the fullest sym-  
pathy of the entire community in his be-  
reavement, which is accentuated by the  
fact that the union was one of exemplary  
harmony. Both parties had exhibited the  
same cordial spirit towards every one with  
whom they came into contact.  
"Mrs. Lewis, it might be stated, was  
only twenty-four years old, was a native  
of St. John (N. B.), and had been married  
only three years ago. Her death is deeply  
regretted. A large number of promi-  
nent citizens attended the funeral. The re-  
mains were placed in a leaden coffin,  
draped in black, and were placed in a  
temporary tomb at La Repentir cemetery.  
The body will be sent to St. John in due  
course. The ceremony of the Jewish ritual  
was performed by Mr. Jessurun."

17th inst. Mary, wife of H. Wathen, of the  
railway mail service of New Brun-  
swick, died. She was a daughter of the  
late John Lennox, of West Branch, Kent
