ALL WIRELESS

U. S. Navy Organize Amateur In"-Sure to Hear Any Foreign

Washington, Oct. 8—All commercial and amateur wireless stations in the United States will soon be organized by the Navy Department for immediate use in case of emergency by the Intelligence Bureau of the Navy.

In the event of war hundreds and perhaps thousands of operators along the coast line would be instructed to "listen in" on any radio conversation that might be in progress within range of their instruments, every station using a different wave length. The result would be to establish a line of radio "eavesdroppers" around the country, which would be certain to intercept any message transmitted by ships at sea or shore stations beyond the borders, south or north.

Intercepted messages would be promptly reported to the Navy Department, which will be able eventually to communicate with all Atlantic Coast, wireless stations, at least, directly from the office of Rear Admiral Benson, chief of Navy operations.

All matters pertaining to the movements of ships, to communications with or between vessels and shore stations, or relating to information valuable to naval commanders falls under the direction of the chief of operations.

Five Wireless Antennae Going Up.

To facilitate co-ordination of the communication methods of the navy, five wireless antennae are now being erected on the roof of the State, War and Navy building here a,nd in a sound-proof room close to Admiral Benson's office a radio exchange station, with five operators and five sets of instruments. From that room conversations can be connected directly with the big central Navy Radio plant at Arlington, Va., and with navy stations along the gulf and Atlantic Coasts.

By relaying through the Arlington station, the department will be brought in direct touch with any part of the vast vireless system now being constructed to reach from Maine to Cuba and from Arlington to the Philippines, with stations at Honolulu and Guam.

Telegraphic and telephone instruments will be installed in rooms arjoining the radio outfits, and when completed Admiral Benson will have a system established for swift handling of navy business, in times of peace or war, not here tofore known.
