GOLD MEDAL WON BY MARJORIE FITZPATRICK

Sidney Murray is Second - Doris Barnes Takes Silver Medal in Grade X, Marjorie Manning Second

medal awarded to the pupil in Grade IX making the highest number of marks in all subjects was won by Miss Marjorie Fitzpatrick, who made 785 out of a possible 900 marks. She was closely followed by Sidney Murray who came second with 757.

The winners of the Corporation gold medal and the Parker silver medal will not be known until the results of the matriculation examinations have been secured.

Miss Fitzpatrick is a daughter of Captain and Mrs. David Fitzpatrick of 250 Duke street, West St. John. Last year Miss Fitzpatrick won three medals, one awarded by G. S. Mayes for the pupil in West St. John making the highest marks in the High School entrance examination, one awarded by R. B. Emerson, chairman of the school trustees, for the pupil making the highest marks in the city in the High School entrance papers, and the third awarded by Governor Wood for the pupil making the highest marks in the course.

Miss Barnes, who won the medal in Grade X, is a daughter of Eustace Barnes of the firm of Barnes & Co., Ltd.

C. P. R. OFFICERS IN CONFERENCE

Local Men Meet With Two Hundred Others

GATHERING IN WINNIPEG

Important Discussions on Matters of Railway Policy Engage Attention of Department Heads

The most important official conference ever held of the officers of the C. P. R. began on Monday in Winnipeg, with something like 200 officers from all over the system in attendance. Among the subjects for discussion are: Maintenance of way standards, equipment of standards in relation to patrons of the road and regulating bodies equipment standards, distribution of power and cars, freight handling, engines, efficiency tests, regulation speed freight and passenger, fuel types of snow fighting equipment, discussion of sleeping and dining car service in relation to public and operation of road, freight claims, stations and staff, relations between traffic department and operating officers, telegraph services, economical handling of passenger cars, industrial sites, uniform system of reporting accidents, etc.

From the foregoing it will be seen that the subjects extend over a wide range of railway interest-taking note, indeed, of all the features which mark the equipment and administration of a great modern railway system. C. E. E. Lisher, passenger traffic manager, is the general chairman, while the eastern and western committees are composed, respectively, as follows: A. Price, A. G. McKenzie and H. J. Humphrey, forming the eastern and D. C. Coleman, Frank Lee and C. E. Stockhill the western committee looking after arrangements.

The occasion is one of the most notable in the history of the company, as every interest is represented and all the departments from time to time will be thoroughly thrashed out and solutions found, if possible. There will, as a result of the meeting, which will be representative of the company in all its interests from ocean to ocean be a stepping up to a still greater effort on each department while strengthening the co-ordination of each department with centralized authority.

Among the more prominent officials from the east who left by special train were: H. C. Grant, general superintendent, St. John; A. C. Price, assistant general manager, Montreal; C. E. E. Lisher, passenger traffic manager; H. P. Timmerman, industrial agent; A. Piers, manager real estate; A. Hatton, general superintendent, car service; F. Britt, general fuel agent; T. Taylor, right of way agent; E. W. Todd, general freight agent; G. Jackson, claims adjuster; W. Shell, general passenger agent; A. J. Altman, car accountant; A. Williams, superintendent, Brownsville; and C. Kyle, master mechanic, St. John.

CAPT. CORBET MAY BE COMMANDER OF AMBULANCE CORPS

It is said that the reason why the commanding officer of the new ambulance corps which is stationed in the armory and for which recruits are being signed on day by day, has as yet not been appointed is due to the fact that the position has been offered to Captain Corbet, M. D., who is at present attached to one of the hospitals in England and no definite answer has yet been received. The acting commandant is Major Bishop. It is also understood that if Captain Corbet would not take over the unit, Major Bishop would be the next in line. The unit has now a strength of forty-four and has its battalion sergeant-major who is E. G. Westall and also its quartermaster, H. Sellen. Mr. Sellen was for several years in the Dominion Atlantic Railway office.

A course of instruction for field officers, captains, lieutenants and machine gun officers will begin at Aldershot camp on Monday.

Captain R. L. Phalen of the Mount Allison contingent of officers' training corps, has been attached to the R. S. R. infantry at Aldershot.

Officers of commissions in the British army to candidates of Canadian officers' training corps are subject to the following regulation. Candidates who have been selected for imperial commissions will be enlisted in the future in British units on completion of course with officer cadet battalion.

Candidates will be granted the option of serving in the ranks of their British unit or taking their discharge and return to Canada or re-enlist in the Canadian forces.

ANOTHER ACCIDENT; GOING TOO FAST

Automobile, No Lights Burning, Crashes Into Team Outside Fairville

That the Manawagonish road is being rendered dangerous to those traveling it through the recklessness of automobile drivers was again proven a little after last midnight when a large car, which showed no lights, came in the road at about a twenty-five mile an hour clip, traveling on the wrong side. When about half a mile from Fairville, the car crashed into a team and it was only through what seemed to be a miracle that some one of the three occupants were not killed. The carriage was badly damaged and the fenders of the auto were practically destroyed. The number of the car could not be ascertained as there was no tail light on the car.

Since the road has been repaired and a considerable amount of gravel placed on it, only one side of the road answers the purpose of a speedway, and several car drivers use this particular side of the road whether going or coming.

THE PLAYGROUNDS

There were at least 300 children on the Allison playground yesterday afternoon. These included for an hour or so about fifty Catholic orphans, in charge of four Sisters. These little ones, neatly dressed in pink presented a very pretty appearance and greatly enjoyed themselves.

The Sisters expressed great pleasure, to Mrs. Matthews, the supervisor, at seeing so many children happily playing under proper care.

At the Aberdeen playground the attendance yesterday was lessened by a picnic, but the average attendance there is between two hundred and fifty and three hundred, with sometimes more than the latter figure. Rev. W. G. Lane went down one day recently and gave the children a candy treat. He is greatly interested in the work and would like to see this ground kept open and supervised in the evening. All the playgrounds are now largely patronized and the teachers would be glad to see more visitors.

The interest in the working boys' league games of baseball on the Peters' playground, foot of Hanover street, in the evenings, are attracting more adults to see the season progresses. The boys are playing an exciting series of games. Jumping pits and high jump standards will be ready by the end of the week, and an athletic meet is being planned for Labor Day.


