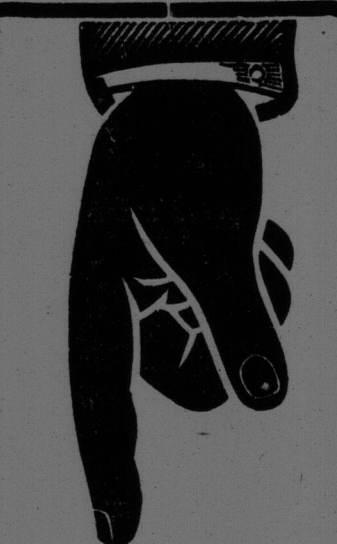

 Maples: H. McGuire, T. Coughlan, J. Crowley, M. Coholan, W. Doherty.

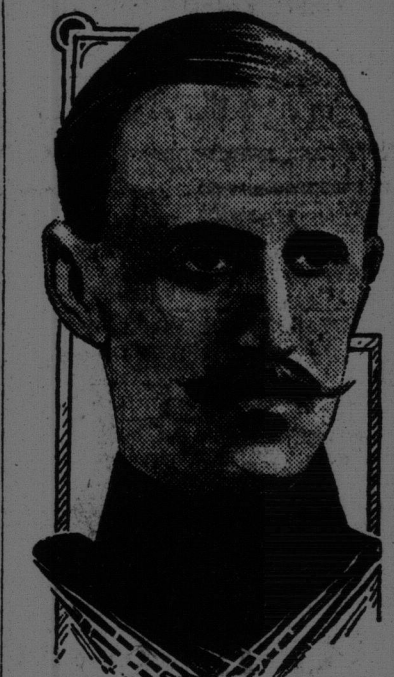
The daily roll-off was won by Covey with a score of 128.

CANADA IN THE WAR



The late Colonel F. D. Farquhar, D.S.O., commanding the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, has been killed in action in France. He was formerly military secretary to H. R. R. the Duke of Connaught. Lieut. Martin of the same regiment was killed also.

Jules Cassagne, of the 28th Light Infantry, a Canadian volunteer, is mentioned in despatches for bravery in action. He refused to surrender on the capture of a German trench and was killed.

The Canadian Car & Foundry Co. of Montreal and Amherst, has received an \$80,000,000 order from the Russian government for supplying shrapnel. This will mean a rush night and day job for a year. The company has already submitted to various firms orders aggregating \$35,000,000.

The sermon yesterday morning in Exmouth street Methodist church to the soldiers of the 26th battalion was delivered by Rev. W. G. Lane and contained much practical advice to the men going abroad.

An interesting budget of news was contained in a letter received this week by a friend here from Miss Joyce Wishart, who left here as nurse and is now in England. The letter was dated March 4 and said that she and the other Canadian nurses expected almost any time to be sent back to France.

Friends throughout the city will regret to learn of the death of Mrs. Margaret Gleeson which occurred Saturday evening at her home, 16 Richmond street, after a brief illness from bronchial trouble. Mrs. Gleeson was about 76 years of age. She was the widow of Patrick Gleeson who died about fourteen years ago and was herself the youngest and last surviving member of the Lawlor family who had their home at Lawlor's Lake, St. John county. She was a very well-known and estimable woman. She is survived by three sons, John F. and P. Joseph, of this city, William L., of St. John and Boston, and two daughters, Misses Mary E. and Regina G., of this city. The late D. J. Gleeson, formerly head of the check room of the customs department at Ottawa, was another son. The funeral will be held Tuesday morning at 10.30 o'clock from the Cathedral after high mass of requiem.

He was twenty-one years of age, and had been employed for the last four years in J. & A. McMillan's wholesale.
